### The Ice plant.

The ice plant of Mr. Bartels is rapidly nearing completion and will probably be in operation in a week or ten days. The cost of the plant has not been considered in fitting it up with all the newest and modern machinery. An ice plant requires some heavy machinery which includes steam boiler, engines, pump, condensers, pipes and tanks, although the process of making the ice is very simple. The freezing apparatus is a tank of salt water which itself does not freeze. In this tank are suspended cans which are filled with distilled water. Through the brine and between the cans run pipes, through which ammonia flows, being forced through by the engine. The ammonia in its chemical changes draws all the heat from the brine, which in its turn draws the heat from the water cans, causing it to freeze. The brine gets to zero and below but does not freeze. The chunk of ice is liberated from the can by being placed under a warm water stream, and is then stored away.

Mr. Bartels is to be commended for his enterprise in establishing this plant, and the people of Cottage Grove will no doubt fully appreciate the fact, as ice is now considered almost as one of the necessities of life.
