Contribution Day.

Today, May 22, is the day set for collecting contributions from the school children all over the state to assist in raising a fund of \$60,000 needed in fitting out the Peary expedition to the north pole, and is designated Peary day.

The scheme it is said originated with Commander Peary, and it has the approval of the state board of education, consisting of Governor Chamberlain, Secretary of State Benson and State Superintendent Ackerman. No child is asked to give more than one cent contribution. Peary's ship, the Roosevelt has a mast made of Oregon pine and his surgeon an Oregonian. Under the new rule adopted by the Western Passenger Association persons who have purchased tickets must fall ill at their own expense. The association has decided to cancel its former rule regarding the extension of tickets for passengers on account of sickness, delayed trains or other legitimate reasons. This means that only the tickets are purchased and the responsibility of the road ends beyond its usual care in conveying passengers to their destination within the time specified only.

The rescinding of this rule follows a decision by the interstate commerce commission to the effect that "Tickets sold at reduced rates, to be used within a limited period, should not be extended because of sickness or other misfortune." The commission explained that while this rule seemed harsh, it was plain that the contrary ruling would open the door to "imposition and evasion."

To this ruling the railroads have added the item regarding trains delayed by accidents, strikes or other matters over which they have no control.

Someone is sending out mimeograph circulars, signed only by the initials of a "committee" of three, proposing that Theodore Roosevelt be made president of the United States for life, with power to nominate his successor. 
