The Eugene-Corvallis canal scheme does not seem to receive much encouragement in the report of the committee appointed to investigate its feasibility and cost, and it is evident that the committee have done their work well and are able to make a very intelligible report. The original cost of the undertaking to say nothing of the repairs that will have to be constantly made if the experience of other canals is to be any criterion, we believe is sufficient reason to dismiss the scheme of a canal.

This does not necessarily mean there is no other means of attaining the same end as was desired by digging the canal, for as is suggested by the committee, and has been spoken of by the Nugget an electric line would be cheaper to build, cheaper to run and to answer every purpose for which the canal was intended.

It would also open a greater opportunity of benefitting and interesting people in a far greater scope of country. Cottage Grove, for instance, would like better transportation and the question has been taken up by the Commercial Club of this place and requests have been made of the various Commercial Clubs in the valley to select delegates to meet at Cottage Grove in the near future to discuss the matter and we would suggest that of an electric line from Cottage Grove via Eugene and Albany to connect with the Corvallis line to Yaquina be made a part of the discussion.
