State Teachers' Association Convention.

The official program is out and preparations are being perfected for the seventh annual convention of the Western division of the Oregon State Teachers' Association Convention which will be held at Salem, July 1, 2 and 3. A meeting of the county superintendents of the state has also been called for those dates and will be held in connection with the association convention, which together with the teachers' institutes of the several counties which have elected to hold sessions here, will combine to make a large convention of teachers and school authorities here.

The convention will be divided into several departments, among the most important of which will be the department of superintendence, a county superintendents convention, Marion, Lion and Polk county institutes, and special meetings of school superintendents and principals, called especially by Superintendent Ackerman to revise the High School course of studies to conform to the newly selected text books made by the state board of text book commissioners. All general sessions will be held in the Christian church and department meetings in the High School and Christian church. Headquarters for the association will be maintained at the Willamette hotel by chairman J. C. Graham of the information bureau, and as special rate of one and one-third fare for the round trip has been granted by the railroad upon the certificate plan.

STENSLOFF CALLED DOWN.

Assertion That 70 per cent of Lane County Sheep are Scabby is Untrue and Ridiculous.

A statement purporting to have emanated from State Sheep Commissioner Stensloff, that 70 per cent of the Lane county sheep were afflicted with scabby, has been widely circulated through the State press, but according to the following communication to the Eugene Register a grievous wrong has been done our county, which should be rectified as soon as possible and as widely as possible under the official signature of Mr. Stensloff.

Editor Register:—I should like to correct a statement published in The Register some time ago that there was 70 per cent of the sheep of Lane county, scabby.

This report has gone out over the state and which, if not corrected, will work great injury to the sheep industry of this section.

After consulting with Mr. Roper, agent of the Federal department, who has been making careful inquiry into the condition of Lane county sheep, and with his statement corroborated by many sheep owners in the county, I desire to state that not ten per cent of the sheep in Lane county are affected with scab.

Whoever caused such a report to be published not only did not know what he was talking about, but did the sheep industry here an almost irreparable injury.

BIG REAL ESTATE DEAL.

Fingal Hinds Closes a Deal With a Medford Fruit Grower.

Our energetic real estate agent Mr. Fingal Hinds, made two sales this week, that is important from the fact that it indicates the trend of the future of this county. His sales were to Mr. Sylvester Boyd of Medford, the Bob Trunnell place of 100 acres and the John Schmit place of 20 acres for the aggregate sum of \$5500. The buyer Mr. Boyd is a fruit grower of Medford and after a thorough investigation, became convinced that Lane county possesses both the climate and soil for fruit raising, equal to if not better than surrounds Medford the hitherto acknowledged fruit center of the state, so disposing of his high priced land in that section came here and purchased as stated, and will go exclusively into the fruit raising business. This is a move that should be largely followed, as there is no doubt but that Lane county is particularly well adapted for fruit raising and when the time comes that fruit in sufficient quantities is raised to bring the Eastern buyers here, when fruit can be bought by the ear load, the prosperity of all will be greatly enhanced.

Lull After the Storm.

Matters relating to the electric railway from Roseburg to the coast seem to be in abeyance somewhat just at present for the reason that no terminal franchises have as yet been secured. Information from Coos bay continues somewhat meager, and as the principal officers of the recently incorporated company reside there, we are still waiting upon their movements. It seems to us that formal applications for franchises should be made at once in all the towns reached by the proposed line and as soon as granted there would be a definite basis upon which to begin the work.

A formal meeting of the incorporators was held in Marshfield Wednesday to authorize the opening of the stock books and taking subscriptions. This is merely a formality to comply with the state law. Whether any stock has yet been subscribed there is not reported.

A number of heavy capitalists and financiers are already making inquiries about the proposed line and matters should be put in such a shape at once that we could interest them in a direct way in the movement. With these franchises secured, engineers could be put into the field at once and the work of construction follow without any needless delay.

Capitalists seem ready to finance the movement. Let the franchises be secured and the construction work commenced as soon as possible.—Rosburg Review.
