The convention of the Western Federation of Miners in session at Denver has agreed upon an amendment to their constitution providing for a referendum vote by any local union before a strike is called and requiring a two-thirds vote.

This is a step in the right direction, and should be followed by all labor organizations. At the present time all local unions are under the almost absolute control of a few men of a higher class who dictate to the members, perhaps constituting the union, while drawing down a good live salary for which the labor is taxed, under the head of "pet capital." The individual labor has nothing to say in any manner as to what shall be done in case of a disagreement between employer and employee. A vast deal of serious trouble might often be avoided, were it not for the "harnessed-javel" agitator who makes it his particular business to see a mountain when there is in reality only a mole hill, and then this is followed frequently by an order to "strike." This order is mandatory, and must be obeyed as well by the toiler with a house full of children and sick wife, as by his younger and more provident brother workman. In many cases when the strike is finally called off, the men engaged in it, have lost more in wages and few weeks than can be earned by the increased gained in as many years. The "strike" should be the last resort and should then only be resorted to when it has the consent of at least a majority of those most vitally interested. This the convention now in session realizes, and by their action mandating their constitution and adding the referendum is forging another link in the chain which with arbitration, will bind labor and capital together, for one cannot get along without the other.

A dispatch to the Oregonian says that Salem and vicinity was visited Saturday by a violent storm. The rain fell in torrents filling gullies and ditches and flooding roads and streets, and although it lasted but half an hour did considerable damage. In the hills south of Salem the rain turned into hail, which at some places along the road was hoaxed to a considerable depth. The damage to fruit cannot yet be estimated. Prunes were knocked off the trees, and experienced growers say that a prune hit by hail becomes deformed and is unmarketable. Whether the rain lasted long enough to cause cherries to crack is uncertain. The storm passed down the valley covering a strip of country about two miles wide. A half mile on either side of the path of the storm no rain fell and farmers were at work in their hay fields or picking cherries in their orchards.

labor; thorough policing all railroad yards, to prevent tramps from boarding trains or lodging in cars; establishment of sanitary municipal lodging houses and abolition of ten cent bed houses. To Clear the Country of Hoboes. Harrison Hill and other railroad chiefs, have entered into an agreement with the National conference of charities and corrections, to secure a national commission of vagrancy. The plan is to clear the railroads and small towns of bums, hoboes and vags generally, force them to be sanitary, to earn their living, or to disappear entirely from the districts where the strong arm of the commission can reach them.

It is estimated that "hoboes" cost the railroads annually two million dollars. They infest yards, set fire to cars, throw switches out of malice, assault towermen and switchmen, break signals and cause disastrous wrecks with appalling loss of life and property.

Here is a brief outline of what is proposed to do: Strict enforcement of existing vagrancy laws; urging the passage of rigid vagrancy laws where present laws are insufficient; the enactment of laws everywhere making vagrancy punishable by imprisonment at hard

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Premature Burials. We republish the following from the Boston Evening Transcript: The New York Medico-Legal Society spent an evening discussing the Reddington bill for the prevention of premature burial which has been offered to the New York Assembly. The bill requires attending physicians to make certain sure tests of death and forbids burial of bodies until seventy-two hours after death. It was the prevailing opinion of the society that premature burial is a possibility, and if there were any doubts their doubts were dispelled when Mrs. Ida T. Bell arose and said: "I am a living example of the possibility of being buried alive. I was prepared for burial and was about to be carried to a hearse when signs of life were discovered and I was saved from the most awful fate that can be conceived."
