The capacity of this plant is said to be very large and its location at this place has brought many a dollar to the Grove merchants.

### An Enthusiastic Meeting.

The Western Oregon Lumber Manufacturers' Association held an enthusiastic meeting in this city last Friday which was largely attended by outside lumbermen.

One of the chief questions of interest discussed was relative to better transportation facilities and a committee was appointed to meet with the representatives of the various commercial bodies to take steps in the interest of the proposed Roseburg-Cove Bay railroad.

It was decided to address a petition to the state railroad commission asking them to place in force a ruling that a book must be kept at all the stations of the various railroads showing the car calls placed with them and the date the cars were furnished, destination and all matters relative to car calls which book must be open for the inspection of all shippers during business hours. It was also decided to ask all the various commercial bodies to address similar petitions.

A unanimous motion was adopted which met with the hearty approval of all the mills connected with the association to reduce cut to 60 per cent of the present output so as to meet the outlook of the present car supply in sight as it was the opinion that the number of cars that could be reasonably expected judging from past experience would be all that would be supplied to move this proportion of the cut. As the mills at present in the association represent a yearly output of one hundred and twenty-five million feet it can readily be seen what this 60 per cent reduction will amount to.

### Outing Will be Held Near Roseburg.

Captain Johnson has received general orders that Separate Co. F. O. N. G., will go into encampment at or near Roseburg, from July 20, to 29, and no doubt the boys look forward to an enjoyable time.

According to the orders issued, the boys assembled at the Armory early Sunday morning last in heavy marching order, equipped for a 24 hour outing.
