

U. OF O. COMMENCEMENT.

The Senior Class This Year Numbers
54—Senator John W. Gearin Delivers the Address.

The thirty-first annual Commencement of the University of Oregon was held Wednesday morning. The graduating class, numbering 54, was addressed by Senator John M. Gearin, of Portland. Of his address, and that of President Campbell's the Register says:

"He said he did not come to offer advice, because advice is not well received, and those who are in a position to give advice are usually not disposed to give. However, he pointed out some of the things that do the work of advice; the traditions of the University, conscientious and patriotism.

The traditions of the University call for MEN—men who will work for the highest ideals, and for honest work.

Patriotism demands not only men to fight for the country's honor, but men who will enter the politics of the nation, not as professional politicians, but as citizens.

He closed his address by wishing the graduates the best of good fortune, success in their future be whatever profession they might enter. Prof. P. L. Campbell, in presenting the diplomas to the graduates, offered some excellent words of advice. He was not speaking at a valedictorian he said, for there is no need of a valedictory, the graduates are not saying "good bye" and going far away but they are simply passing into the further work of the university; that of graduate work in the commonwealth of Oregon."

Miss Louisa Antoinette Burwick and John Curran Veatch of this city were among the graduates receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and many of their friends and relatives here attended the commencement exercises.

At the Alumni banquet Wednesday evening, Mr. Veatch responded to the toast, "Student Life at the University." He has won laurels as a debator during his college days, having won in the State debating league, and also at Salt Lake at the Inter-State league, making Oregon champion of the Northwest.

Comes Next Month.

In a letter to United States Attorney William C. Bristol today, Francis J. Heney announced his intention of coming to Oregon to prosecute land fraud defendants as soon as the situation at San Francisco permits. This is expected to be about the middle of July, although it is believed by many persons that Mr. Heney will be in Portland on Monday following July 4th.

After the acquittal of Binger Hermann in Washington last spring Mr. Heney announced his desire to come to Portland to prosecute the former commissioner of the land office, who is indicted in several land fraud cases but who will be tried for his part in the Blue Mountain conspiracy case in which Senator Pierce Mayes, George Sorenson and Willard N. Jones were convicted last summer.

Mr. Heney did not refer in his letter to what part he would play in the case of Louis B. Glass, the telephone man, whose trial for bribery comes up this week in San Francisco. It is popularly believed that Mr. Heney will turn the case over to Hiram Johnson to prosecute, although no such information has been given out publicly by Mr. Heney. If he should do this it would give him an opportunity to make his arrival in Portland earlier.

In addition to prosecuting the case against Hermann, Mr. Heney will also prosecute R. A. Booth and former United States Attorney John A. Hall. None of these cases can be tried before July because of the lack of government funds. The new appropriation becomes effective July 1 and will be apportioned by the middle of the month.—Journal.
