## Council Meeting.

At an adjourned meeting of the city council held Tuesday evening an ordinance was introduced amending a former ordinance regulating the sale of alcoholic compounds used as beverages. The object of the amendment is to make the city law conform to the state law and the fines collected will go into the city treasury instead of the county fund as is now the case, the law being operated by the state officials. Having in possession a United States revenue license is held as evidence that the holder is selling spirituous liquors. The ordinance was read the first time.

The council reconsidered the vote of last meeting on the petition of improving River street and granted the petition and instructed the street committee to begin at once in order that the work may be completed before winter sets in.

A petition causing a great deal of discussion was one signed by a great many of the business men of the city, asking that the city employ but one policeman, he to act night-watch leaving the city without a day policeman. The matter was laid over until next regular meeting.

The finance committee was instructed to open correspondence, through the treasurer, with the holders of city water bonds, for the purchase of five \$1900 bonds.
