## FIRE AT EUGENE

Six Buildings Destroyed—Will be Rebuilt of Brick.

A fire broke out a little after noon on Monday and completely gutted six business establishments, all in wooden buildings, between Sixth street and the Midgley building on the east side of Willamette street, entailing a loss of at least \$10,000, with very little insurance, probably less than \$500.

The fire started at the front corner of Murray & Cherry's paint shop and the Oregon hotel, above the cooling, and from all the testimony and evidence, came from the kitchen chimney of the hotel, thus tracing the origin to a defective flue.

Mr. Sanford, the owner of the burned property does not take his loss seriously. He says he had recovered more than the value of the buildings from rent, and is well satisfied that they are now burned off. He expects to clear the ground and get ready at once to build a good two-story brick building which is to be used for hotel purposes.

## NEW SCHOOL BOOKS.

Parents Will Have to Buy Practically All the New Books.

There will be considerable kick coming by patrons of the public schools when they come to foot the bills for the change of text books that the text book commission of the state have brought upon them. In the eighth grade there will only be a single book left (the speller) which was used before. The price given in exchange is so small that it practically means the purchase of new books all around. In order that patrons of the school may know what they have to face on the 26th of next month, the Register has taken the trouble to secure a list of the new books, the price in cash which must be paid when exchange is made, as well as the regular retail price. The list is only for books used in the grades. There is so large a list in the high school that it was not thought worth while to give the list except for the grades:
