The Norwegian Saengerfest of the Northwest, which is held in Astoria from August 30 to September 2, in conjunction with the Regatta and County Fair and the annual outing of the State Editorial Association, will be the most important held by that body in the history of the west. Three hundred voices from over a dozen of the leading cities in Oregon, Washington and California will engage in competition.

All the voices are trained and have been selected from a large number by Professor Sperati, who is drilling them every day and will do so from the present time until the opening of the big celebration. The competition will take place in the Astoria Theatre and only a limited number will be able to hear them.

At an enormous expense Madame Norelli, the famous singer, Dr. Enna, the pianist, and other noted artists of worldwide reputation, have been secured for the program. Numerous other interesting features have been provided by the Saengerfest, notably the Viking ship and King pageantry.

The Astoria and Columbia River Railroad is giving an excellent service for its beach traffic this season. Two through trains are run daily from Portland to Clatsop Beach points leaving at 8 A. M. and 6 P. M., returning leaving Seaside at 7:10 A. M. and 5 P. M. In addition to these trains there is a Saturday special leaving Portland 2:10 P. M. and arriving at Seaside at 6:55 P. M. The hotel accommodations at all Clatsop Beach resorts are excellent and ample for the heavy summer travel.

The Telegram says: Whether Francis J. Heney ever comes to Oregon to resume prosecution of the land fraud cases is up to the Attorney General of the United States. And the same is true as to whether William C. Bristol will retain the office of United States attorney for Oregon. Recent developments are such that it can be written down as a fact that Mr. Heney and Mr. Bristol will not continue indefinitely to sit on the lid. If the administration at Washington expects a luke-warm policy to continue in vogue as to the Oregon land fraud situation it is a safe prediction that Mr. Bristol will quit the place and tell the department of justice to look elsewhere for a man to take his place and nothing is more certain than that Mr. Heney will lay down his title as special assistant to the United States attorney general.

With the departure of four big armored cruisers—the Colorado, West Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania—from Japan for San Francisco, the movement to collect a strong fleet in Pacific coast waters is well under way. It is announced at the navy department that necessary rep i

Tennessee and Washington, now at Hampton Roads and Newport, respectively, will be completed by

September 28, and immediately after that date they will proceed to the Pacific. The protected cruiser St. Louis, en route from Hampton Roads to San Francisco, steamed on August 15, from Callao, Peru, Acapulco, Mexico, while the protected cruiser Cincinnati and Raleigh are well on the way from Yokohama to Honolulu, en route to the Pacific Coast. These details are the most recent developments of the change of the naval policy, the most significant feature of which has been the president's decision to send the Atlantic fleet of 16 battleships to the Pacific.

GREAT RIFLE SHOOT BEING HELD.

Riflemen of ability and national reputation were on hand in force when real work began in the great interstate rifle shooting tournament of the National Rifle Shooting Association, at Camp Perry, Fort Clinton, Ohio. From now until the end of the month the picked rifle shot of America will compete on the splendid new ranges for the trophies and big cash prizes offered by congress and the National Rifle Association. The tournament without doubt is doubt is destined to be the greatest affair of its kind the United States has ever seen.

The present week has been given over wholly to the National Rifle Association tournament, which heretofore has been held on the ranges at Sea Girt, New Jersey. The matches began with the company team match, for teams of five, with \$100 \$50 cash prizes. The other new prize contests on the week's program are the state secretaries' 600-yard match for secretaries of the National Rifle Association, and the Herrick trophy presented by ex-Governor Myron T. Herrick of Ohio, and \$200, \$100, \$50 and \$25 cash prizes. The last named completion is for teams of eight, 15 shots at 800, 900 and 1000 yards.

Forty-seven state teams, in addition to 200 or 200 individual contestants, are entered on the lists. These 47 teams will fight in the national match next week for the handsome national trophy authorized by congress. New contestants this year are the United States National Academy, North Carolina, Wyoming, Kentucky and South Dakota.

The picked shot of the United States Infantry, the United States Cavalry and the United States Marine Corps will take part, and the prize sharpshooters of the state will put forth every effort to whip the regulars for the infantry captured the coveted glory last year, with the cavalry second.—Medford Mail.

MARTIN OPHUS CLEARED BY JURY.

mentary teachers—especially for the ungraded country schools.

"It would be a misfortune if this state should have to close any one of the normal schools at present when with new laws and new inspirations this state is entering upon a new educational era. If this board under the new law finds it impossible to carry on all the schools as they were turned over to them by their predecessors, the local communities should rally to their support and provide the means for carrying them. To close the door of a single educational institution in this state, when it is carried on along profession lines, and under a business administration free from local control and without a dollar of graft, would be bad policy, when it is a monumental fact that the Oregon schools are in need of hundreds of teachers with some professional equipment which they cannot secure."
