LARGE FRESHMAN CLASS.

Estimates on the freshman class at the University of Oregon, for the coming year place the number at about 200 students, of whom nearly 25 per cent will probably come from Portland and vicinity. This class will be the largest in the history of the institution, and will bring the total close up to the 500 mark and the whole enrollment to 750.

The courses this year will be up to their usual standard, and with the opening of the new library building, which has been accepted, a great deal of additional and badly needed room will be at the disposal of the institution.

POULTRY EXHIBITION.

The Calapooia Poultry Association met again Tuesday evening and much enthusiasm was shown. A number of fanciers in the county joined the Association, among them being several ladies. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, December 12, 13 and 14 was chosen as the time for holding the poultry exhibition in this city, and it is intended to make it the largest and best exhibition ever held in the county.

Captain J. C. Johnson was elected vice-president, the constitution and by-laws adopted and other important business attended to. There will be another meeting next Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock, to complete organization, after which the regular monthly meeting will be held on the first Monday evening of each month.

BUSINESS CHANGE.

Mr. LeRoy Woods, of the firm of Wheeler-Thompson Co., has disposed of his interest to his partners and severs his connection with the firm. Mr. Woods is a rustling energetic business man, and it is hoped that he intends to remain in Cottage Grove, although at present he has not decided into what line of business he will enter. He left the first of the week for Portland, and before he returns will probably decide as to his future move.

CHANGE AT S. P. DEPOT.

A much needed change has been made at the depot by the S. P. Railroad Company, by the addition of a day operator. Heretofore Mr. Isham the accommodating agent, has had all the work to attend to, but the increase of shipments and heavy traffic has caused the company to send him relief. C. Moken is now the day operator and S. Smithfield takes the night routine, and Mr. Isham is the general agent. A railroad company is generally slow in making such changes, but the Southern Pacific is possibly no slower in that regard than any other company, and we think that the people can depend upon them to make any needed change that will benefit the shippers of Cottage Grove when it is rightly presented to them.

Epworth League Entertained.

Last Friday evening a crowd of young people, composed largely of the Epworth League of the M. E. Church, was entertained by Rufus Arne at his home on the farm south of town. Games were played around a large bonfire until refreshments were served. Late in the evening it commenced to rain and the guests had to depart for home. Many were without umbrellas, but it did not dampen their appreciation of Mr. Arnes' hospitality.

LIGHTS TURNED ON AGAIN.

On Sunday, July 21, at 12:30 fire completely destroyed the electric light plant in this city, and many predicted it would be six months before the city would again have lights. The Willamette Valley Company, owners of the plant, said however, that the lights would again be turned on in thirty days, and they kept their word, for on Wednesday, August 21, the machinery was started and "there was light." The Company is certainly to be commended for its excellent work. Scarcely before the embers were dead they had a force of men at work clearing away the debris and work on the new plant was kept up continuously, and the machinery on the ground to be installed as soon as the foundation were built.

The new plant is larger and more complete in every way than the old one, and is virtually fire-proof. The engine is a 275 horse power automatic Russell and the two boilers are of 100 horse power each, with another to be added at once. The dynamo is much larger than the old one and is modern in every detail.

The Company has spared neither time nor money in rebuilding the plant and getting the city out of darkness and our citizens fully appreciate their efforts and congratulate themselves that our city is as well lighted as any in the state.
