

GLASS MADE IN OREGON

Factory at Coburg, Lane County, the Only One in Oregon.

"Secretary E. C. Giltner of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, has received a specimen of the first glass made in Oregon, from the factory of D. Mathisen at Coburg. This specimen is in the form of a paper weight and of the pale blue color of the insulators used on telegraph poles. It is considered quite a curiosity on account of its indicating the vast possibilities in the glass manufacturing industry of the state.

"The new glass factory was started without any flourish of trumpets," Mr. Giltner says, "and it is now prepared to make all kinds of glass, including window panes, bottles, mirrors, etc. The owner of the new plant writes to E. M. Cederbergh, of this city in regard to obtaining some chemicals used in the manufacture of glass in northern Europe. Mr. Cederbergh is vice-consul in this city for Norway and Sweden and the new glass maker is a Norwegian. The extent of the plant is not known here, but its importance is duly appreciated."

"Coburg is a station on the Southern Pacific in the northeastern part of Lane county, where a good quality of sand for the making of glass is found, and where the facilities for obtaining salt are considered as good as in any portion of the state."—Telegram.
