The 1907 state fair is a thing of the past, and it proved to be the most successful from every point of view in the history of Oregon. During the whole time there has been no serious complaints and not one word of adverse criticism has been heard from press or public. Everyone seemed pleased and satisfied, and we may look for a greater exposition next year. The vast improvements in buildings and grounds, and the better accommodations was highly appreciated both by visitors and exhibitors, and the fair management is highly praised for its excellent work. Saturday, the last day, proved a most successful wind-up. There was a large attendance and the visitors were treated to a splendid program.

The citizens of the great Harney county have made an urgent appeal to the people of all parts of the state to make a special effort to visit Burns, October 8th to 12th, when their fair is in session, and see the products of Oregon's biggest county. Artesian water has been found at a depth of less than three hundred feet in Harney Valley and the people are rejoicing.

The Oregon State Fair at Salem last week was a record breaker in point of attendance, and the speed contests were the best in the history of the fair and aroused even more enthusiasm than when pools were sold. The twelve new stables which housed the splendid livestock exhibit were visited by many thousands, there being as many ladies as men present. The displays of products of the soil were up to those in quality shown at the Lewis & Clark Exposition, and the crowd was admirably handled.

## A DOUBLE RECEPTION

Given at the Christian Church on Monday Night.

On Monday night the large auditorium of the Christian church was filled by an audience assembled for a double purpose; to give Rev. Olson and wife a farewell reception and a welcome to his successor Rev. and Mrs. W. A. Elkins.

Rev. Olson leaves on Thursday for Eugene, where he enters the Divinity school to complete his course. Rev. Olson has been in charge of the Christian church of this place for the past two years and has gained the love and respect of not only the members of the church, but of all with whom he has come in contact in a business or social way. He has been a hard and enthusiastic worker and from the report given Monday night by Dr. Maey, has largely added to the church in property and membership by his indefatigable energy. During his pastorate, additions to the property to the value of \$3000 has been made, including a fine gymnasium which has been a great factor in furnishing amusement for the young members and others, aiding largely in improving the morals of the community. As part of his church work he has performed a dozen marriage ceremonies, preached 250 sermons, aside from officiating at funeral services, etc, has held three revival meetings, one at Seattle and Hoquiam in Washington and one at Franklin in this state.

During the evening a fine program was rendered by members of the church, assisted by others. It was opened by a song by the congregation, after which an address of welcome was given by Rev. Beatty, pastor of the M. E. Church to the new minister, Rev. W. A. Elkins to his new charge. He was followed by Mr. Ed Finnerty, president of the Endeavor Society; Miss Myrtle DeSpain in behalf of the Juniors; Mrs. LeRoy Woods in behalf of the C. W. B. M. and J. B. Prozman in behalf of the Sunday School, who all spoke along the same line. Responses were made by Rev. Olson and Rev. Elkins which concluded the program part.

Before the audience was dismissed for a social gathering, Dr. Macy stepped forward and said that in behalf of the Ladies Aid Society he desired to present Rev. Olson and wife with a handsome salad set as a small token of their respect for them personally and appreciation for the work they had accomplished here.

Rev. Olson replied in a few well chosen words, saying that the gift was highly appreciated and thanking them for the aid they had given in assisting him in every way to forward the work of the church and that they both would ever remember their sojourn among the people of Cottage Grove with delight and pleasure.

In the reception room two booths had been erected and handsomely decorated with evergreens and flowers, from which refreshments were furnished to every one, consisting of punch and cake, and in the Endeavor room, a similar booth for the same purpose had been erected for the boys. Thus a most pleasant evening was spent and one that will undoubtedly be long remembered by the parties to whom the reception was given.
