

## Bidders For School Lands.

One hundred and two bids were received and opened by the State Land Board on Sept. 16, for the purchase of an aggregate of 10,000 acres of indemnity school land, situated in different parts of the state but final action will not be taken upon them until Clerk Brown, of the land board, will have had time to segregate, compare and group them in order that a better understanding of them may be arrived at. The prices offered range from the minimum of \$5 per acre, as fixed by law, to as high as \$35.00 per acre. This land was reserved or withdrawn from sale by virtue of the act of the legislature. As indicated by the high prices offered, especially the \$5 per acre bid, much of the land is covered with a wealth of fine timber and much of it is first class agricultural land.

The total gate receipts for the State Fair, President W. U. Downing announced Wednesday amount to \$20,000 approximately, as against \$18,000 last year, or an increase of \$2,000. This is exclusive of the receipts from concessions and grandstand, which were also large, and will bring the grand total to nearly \$30,000.
