

Proof Positive.

Portland, Oct. 2.—Complete and incontrovertible proof of the existence of a diabolical plot on the part of political enemies of Mayor Lane to blacken his good name, and if possible drive him from his position as the executive of Portland, was furnished this morning by the statement of A. N. Wills, president of the city council, that E. E. Radding some six weeks ago had proposed to him and Thomas C. Devlin, a plan by which Mayor Lane could be trapped in his office by a woman. The plan was proposed by Radding and was turned down by both Wills and Devlin, according to the statement of Mr. Wills, and was evidently taken to other and more complaisant men.

Councilman Wills is a political enemy of Mayor Lane and has in the past been opposed to him on many political problems affecting the government and conduct of the city and its affairs. To him, and to Thomas Devlin, defeated by Lane for election to the Mayor's chair, Radding took his dastardly plan after weeks of ingratiating effort to make himself friendly and acceptable to the men, and he trusted to this political enmity to secure their acceptance and approval. Mr. Devlin confirms the statement made by Mr. Wills.
