Cottage Grove's contribution of Company "E" to the Oregon National Guard in taking first prize in the annual shoot and other good marksmanship proves the quality of our citizens when once set about to do something. It was almost a walkover their score being 12 points above the best record made by any other competing team, 17 points above Roseburg where the cup has been held two years and 132 points above the lowest score.

Through the organization of Company "E" the State of Oregon has added a strong acquisition to its military strength and Cottage Grove has won a distinction that will advertise the city to a great advantage, for Company "E" and Cottage Grove go together. The encouragement given our boys by the citizens is commendable and worthily bestowed.

The United States government has had a scientific expedition this past summer on the Aleutian group of Islands and one result out of many valuable ones obtained has been the marking and identifying of one of the largest sulphur deposits in the world. These islands are all volcanic and on them exist free gold, platinum, quartz, copper and sulphur. It is expected by many that the exploitation that will be given to these islands by the Alaska-Yukon Pacific Exposition, which will be held at Seattle in 1909 and the amount of original information that will be collected and dispersed by it about the most westerly section of the world, will have the effect of sending thousands of settlers to the islands. Fisheries, ranching, mining, are all possible on both a large and small scale, and the best methods in each and all cases will be fully demonstrated by the Exposition.

Judge Thomas H. Burke and M. F. Backus, commissioners to the Orient for the Alaska-Yukon Pacific Exposition, are now in Japan where they presented an official invitation to the Japanese government to participate in the 1909 fair. Messrs Burke and Backus will visit all of the Oriental countries bordering on the Pacific to endeavor to get them to take part in the exposition. As one purpose of the exposition is to exploit the countries of the Pacific and increase the trade between them, it is expected that the commissioners will meet with success in every instance.

Business men returning from the East are unanimous in predicting an enormous immigration to Oregon during the coming year. People residing in the great cities of New York, Chicago, Brooklyn, Philadelphia, Boston, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and other population centers never expressed so much anxiety to hear about this country as at present and the same idea is reflected through the correspondence of the Portland Commercial Club, much of which is originating in the cities named above.

President Ed T. Judd of the Oregon State Dairy Association, reports constantly increasing interest in the big state meetings to be held in Portland, December 12th and 13th. Constant additions are being made to the prizes, and an active committee is at work. It is desired above everything else that the farmers be present on this occasion.

An investment company of Portland proposes to erect a structure on Fourth street that will house 2000 Chinese. There will be 18 stores on the first floor and the entire upper portion will be occupied by the "chinks." The middle part of the building will be provided with a joss-house, after the approved plan of San Francisco.

This year has been a remarkably productive one for Lane, as evidenced by the abundance of everything that has been grown this year. Our exhibit at the state fair, which, in the judgment of visitors, easily won first prize, was proof of that fact and clearly shows that we have the banner agricultural county of the state. As such, we certainly are passing up the best advertising medium we could possibly have—that of an annual county fair.

Next year we expect to have the second southern Oregon district fair here. Let that event be the beginning of the regular annual event by which we shall hereafter, every year, have a fair of our own.—Register.

SCHOOL BOARD CONVENTION.

Eugene, Oregon, Oct. 22, 1907. The chairman of the school boards of Lane county:—

Under authority granted me by the school laws of the State of Oregon, I have decided to hold an annual School Board Convention for Lane County, in the high school in Eugene, Oregon, November 9, 1907, beginning at 10 o'clock a. m.

The chairman of the board is delegate to the convention but if he is unable to attend he shall appoint some member of his board or the clerk to represent the district. Each delegate receives two dollars from the general fund of the county provided he attends the entire session. "Consolidation of Schools" "Union High Schools" and other subjects will be discussed by the convention.

State Superintendent Ackerman, President Campbell and Superintendent Alderman of Eugene will be present and assist in the discussion of the different subjects. Lane county has more school districts than any other county in the state and I would like to see every district represented so that we may have the largest School Board Convention in the state.

Regarding Homestead Entries.

Department of the Interior, General Land Office, Washington D. C., October 29, 1907. Registers and Receivers, United States Land Offices.

Sirs: You are directed to at once inform all newspapers in your respective districts, as a matter of news, that in all cases where homestead entries are made after Nov. 1, 1907, commutation proofs must show actual and continuous bona fide residence for the full period of fourteen months.

In all cases where the entries were made before Nov. 1, 1907, the rule heretofore existing that six months constructive residence following the date of the entry will be considered as a part of the required fourteen months residence, will remain in force.
