The Crystal Consolidated Mining Company has done some good development work this winter. After driving the tunnel ahead and into good ore the width of which was undetermined, the manager instructed the miners to cross-cut to the walls. In doing so they have opened a ledge over twenty feet in width, a great part of it being good ore.

The company will soon have sufficient lumber and mine timbers sawed, when the boiler will be placed in the mill and the reduction of ore will begin.

Something over four feet of milling ore is reported in the breast of the Vesuvius mine and it is said to pan well in gold.

The Oregon Securities mill has been started on ore, only a portion of the stamps will be used until the ore shoots are more fully developed.
