We want this information prior to the opening of the Exposition, and if you will send us the copy of your paper containing the article, we can undoubtedly do you a great deal of good. It is the intention of the Portland Chamber of Commerce to promote the developments of the entire state, without prejudice to any locality, and to make the most of the present opportunity to advertise our resources and to follow up this work actively after the Fair.

Visited Blackbutte Mines.

Mr. Levi Tilsonson of Portland and who has quick silver claims in the south-eastern part of the state, came to the city recently and from here drove out to the Blackbutte mines.

He, upon his return stated he had learned of the improved methods of reducing cinnabar ores that is being introduced by Mr. Dennis and was, before putting up a plant at his mine, anxious to learn the best method of treatment.

He found, he said, this plant with its new improvements working very successfully and he believed the beginning of the best and most economical treatment of that class of ores ever erected.

For years Mr. Dennis has been developing the cinnabar properties at Blackbutte and has been of the opinion that the usual methods of reduction could be greatly improved.

For the past year he has been at considerable expense rebuilding and changing the furnaces, and recently has been testing the plant, which thus far have proven highly satisfactory.

The mines at Blackbutte are practically inexhaustible and they will undoubtedly be a source of revenue for many years to come.

Make the Request.

The Commercial Club of Cottage Grove should make a request upon the Governor to furnish from the State Fish Hatcheries at least 1,000,000. Try to stock the streams of the Coast Fork and Rowe River. This section of the state is entitled to consideration and at the rate that trout is being taken from the streams in a very few years you will find that there is no fishing in this section. The writer knows what he is talking about, and once your streams are depleted you will find that it will take years to get them back to where they are now.

I say look after this gentlemen for if the club will take no interest in this, there is no one else in Cottage Grove that will.

There is I believe a game warden in Cottage Grove, these trout could be shipped to him and with but little cost or trouble could be put in to streams and if this was done each year as it should be and kept up and good sport would be furnished each year.

There is talk I hear of organizing a gun club. It would be far better to organize a game and fish protective association and try and have suitable laws passed that when a man went fishing or hunting, limit him to a certain amount and as an association take it upon yourselves to assist the warden in bringing to justice any one who violated the law. I ask you as members of the Commercial Club to take this matter up and formulate some mode of procedure to not only protect the game but where ever it is possible keep this vicinity stocked up to the limit.

Russians Reinforce Garrison and Forts of Vladivostok.

Tokio, 13.—It is reported here that the Russians are continually reinforcing the garrison at Vladivostok and that the work of strengthening the fortress is constantly progressing. It is said that the plans of the Russians contemplate a garrison numbering 100,000 men, with 500 guns. Many additional batteries, redoubts, barriers and pits are in course of construction and enormous stores of ammunition are being accumulated.

The Russians, it is said have equipped their fortress that it is capable of withstanding a siege.

Russians Invile Battle.

London, April 13.—British naval men comment on the lack of secrecy regarding Admiral Rojestvensky's movements since his arrival in Far Eastern waters. The fact that he is keeping to the main trade route, although knowing his squadron would constantly be sighted, and reported by passing vessels, they consider clearly shows that the Russian Admiral is keenly anxious to meet Admiral Togo and fight it out to a finish.

Fell Twenty-two Feet.

Last Saturday evening while Tom Miller was walking down the Booth-Kelly flume above Saginaw, he missed his footing and fell a distance of twenty-two feet.
