THE REAL CAUSE.

The Chicago Telegram maintains that the Chicago Chronicle maintains that the attacks made on John D. Rockefeller and his money are due to an "I am holier than thou spirit."

In its own words:
All the attacks that are made on John D. Rockefeller and his money are founded on an assumption of superior virtue in those who make them. All of his assailants are virtually saying: "Stand by thyself; come thou not near to me, for I am holier than thou."
This claim is not true. The Telegram has frankly admitted that Mr. Rockefeller is not the only sinner of our time, that in a very true and deep sense we all are responsible for Mr. Rockefeller. The greed of John D. Rockefeller is only our own greed writ large. The fact that we are willing to receive his money, that we are willing to receive it and honor it while receiving it is sufficient proof of this.

But the refusal to take his money, the refusal to kneel before the financial pedestal upon which he stands, would be a sign of returning health among us. It would show that we were ashamed of ourselves, so ashamed that we would not longer be partners in sin with John D. Rockefeller and those who acquire their money in the same kind of way.

The trouble with us is that we have come to feel that money is the supreme good of life, and that the man who has it is a man to be envied and worshiped, no matter how ill-gotten his gains may be. No end of evil has come from this characteristic American attitude. It has sapped our independence. It has tangled art in its cradle. It has clothed sterling honesty in rags. It has led to some of the most damnable precepts that the human race has ever heard. The revolt against Rockefeller and his money is evidence that the light is beginning to

break through our darkness, that we have come to see how false is the attitude which has been held, that in the future we shall try to do better.

Some people would not know how to live if Rockefeller methods were to be superseded by nobler ideals. The opening up of realms of light would seem to them as though the bottom had dropped out of the universe. But the world is not designed to give comfort to such as they.

A BROAD IDEA.

Formulated by the King of Italy, but American in Origin.
The king of Italy has put forth a project which appears ideal if not utopian from the sentimental and confessional standpoint, yet excellent from an economical and technical point of view could it be sincerely and thoroughly carried out. At the instance of King Victor Emmanuel the Italian government has addressed a note to the powers proposing that a conference be held in Rome next May for the purpose of considering a scheme for establishing an international chamber of agriculture.

The king explained his proposal in a letter to the head of the Italian government, frankly admitting that the original idea had been introduced to him by a citizen of the United States. Briefly put, the king proposes, therefore, that the different leading nations should combine to form an international institution absolutely unpolitical in its aims which would consider the conditions of agriculture in the countries of the world and which would periodically notify the quantity and quality of the crops in hand so as to facilitate the production of such crops and make their distribution less costly and more rapid.

Other points would be the supplying of information as to the demand and supply of agricultural labor in different parts of the world, the promotion of agreements necessary for united defense against diseases of plants and domestic animals and the encouragement of societies for rural co-operation, for agricultural insurances and for agrarian credit.
Naturally such an institution would not only tend to consolidate the agricultural classes, but would yield a powerful influence for peace, for by promoting a knowledge of other countries and by extending the business relations of the various nations with each other war would daily become a more hateful and impossible thing than ever.

Hen Manures.

Such strong manures (hen manures) are best adapted when applied to any leaf crops, such as spinach, cabbage, kale and Swiss chard. Being highly nitrogenous, they induce growth of leaf. They should be applied sparingly to fruit crops, such as tomatoes, peppers and strawberries, says an exchange.
