No Depot Telephone.

This week the telephone at the S.
P. depot was removed and there is
no way of communicating with that
place but by going there in person
or sending someone, which is of
great inconvenience to very many
of the telephone subscribers.

There was considerable feeling
manifested when it was learned of
the action of the Telephone Com-
pany in the removal of the tele-
phone.

That there was a reason for such
action was evident and an effort was
made to learn it.

As near as so far ascertained, the
Telephone Company asked for and
received permission to place in the
depots of the S. P. road its tele-
phones. It is understood the Tele-
phone Company believed the plac-
ing of the phones in the depots
would aid in increasing its business
and it is further understood that
until recently there has been any at-
tempt to collect of the railroad Co.
for their use.

It is learned indirectly that
courtesies of some kind heretofore
extended to the Telephone Com-
pany by the S. P. were withdrawn
and in retaliation the phones have
been removed.

There seems to be a clash between
two corporations, neither of which
are put to any considerable incon-
venience, but the subscribers and
patrons are practically the only
sufferers.

There have been many patrons of
the Telephone Company who have
stated they would discontinue their
phones, unless the depot is again
connected.

Perhaps it is better to wait a few
days and see what action will be
taken.
