Big Strike in Blue River Mines.

Editor F. M. Brown, of Brownsville, and Rev. T. P. Howard, of Gervais, who came down from Brownsville this morning, reports a rich strike in the Hercules mine, in the Blue River mine, in which Rev. Howard is a third owner, says yesterday's Albany Democrat. His partners, W. H. Scott and J. E. Brooks, came out from the mines yesterday with a sack of what is said to be the finest ore ever taken out of the district. It was discovered by Mr. Scott and Mr. Brooks fifteen feet from the surface in a three-foot ledge, in two places seven hundred feet apart revealing the same condition. The ore is free milling, revealing wires, and is undoubtedly a big thing. The surprise is to find so much near the surface. Messrs. Howard, Scott and Brooks own five claims, of which the Hercules is one. It is close to the Calopooia, near the Great Northern, on this side. Across the Calopooia in an other claim nearly as good has been discovered.

Rev. Howard, who was at Gervais, was telephoned upon the arrival of his partners at Brownsville. It is proposed to put in a mill if assays and investigations justify. The present indication is \$300 or \$400 ore in large quantities.—Guard.
