Referendum Petition.

The referendum petitions, de-
manding that House bill No. 370,
known as the \$1,000,000 appropria-
tion bill, be referred to a vote of the
people, was filed in the office of the
Secretary of State Thursday forenoon.
The appropriation bill will there-
fore not take effect, but will remain
in abeyance until after the general
election in June, 1906. At that
time the question will be presented
to the people whether the appropria-
tion bill shall become a law. If a
majority voting thereon vote in the
affirmative, the bill will become a
law, and not otherwise.

Lewis and Clark Exposition.

During the Lewis and Clark Ex-
position the Southern Pacific Com-
pany will sell round trip tickets to
Portland, limit thirty days, at one
and one-third fare for the round
trip. For organized parties of 100
or more, individual tickets at one
fare for the round trip.

given at Portland on all one-way
tickets running through that point
during the exposition. Tickets

at Portland and charge of fifty
