Program For the Day As Outlined By Committee.

Petition to Council.

The following petition will be presented to the next meeting of the city council for consideration at its meeting Monday night:

To the honorable Mayor and City Council of Cottage Grove, Ore.

We, the undersigned citizens of Cottage Grove, realizing the value and benefits derived through the rightful use of bicycles on our streets and sidewalks, would respectfully request, that, in as much as an ordinance will be considered by your honorable body in the near future, prohibiting entirely the use of any and all sidewalks within the city limits of Cottage Grove, for the use of bicycles; you carefully consider whether or not by so doing you would not seriously inconvenience the rights and privileges of many law abiding, and otherwise innocent bicyclists and citizens of Cottage Grove.

We would respectfully call your attention to the fact that most all of our streets are during the greatest portion of the year almost entirely unfit for bicycle use; and that practically all cities throughout the state of the size of Cottage Grove and Eugene, allow such privileges within certain limits, and on certain streets.

We would therefore ask if such arrangement cannot be made by our City Council, with such restrictions as may seem advisable; providing a penalty for those who, by their reckless and utter disregard of City Ordinances, force these issues upon the people.

The petition is signed by a large number of citizens and is likely to receive favorable consideration.

IS HONORED ON BIRTHDAY

Many Citizens Meet and Congratulate Robert J. Carey on His Arrival at The Seventy-fifth Milestone, Still Hale and Hearty.

Seventy-five years ago in the state of Missouri, Robert J. Carey was born. There he grew up and worked at the blacksmith trade until 1874 when a desire to come to Oregon took possession of him and soon he was, with his family located at what is now the city of Cottage Grove. For years he followed his trade and then cleared up and carried on a farm at Gowdville just west of this city.

Mr. Carey has three daughters, Mrs. Wm. Mealey, Mrs. Jeff Markley and Mrs. E. A. Underwood, all of whom live in or near the city. A son died years ago. Mr. Carey has buried two wives and last fall in Missouri he married a very pleasant and sociable lady to journey the rest of the way with him. For a man of his age, he is remarkably well preserved and would keep many a younger man busy in following him. Always a hard worker yet taking good care of himself has no doubt contributed to his good health and strength.

For many years he has been a member of the Masonic and Eastern Star orders. These orders appreciating his life and work, and learning of his approaching birthday, decided to honor him in a special manner.

In accordance therewith, arrangements were made for a gathering of his associates and friends at the Masonic hall on Thursday night.

On the lower floor two long tables were placed and loaded with a splendid lunch where at least one hundred and fifty were supplied, with ample provision for many more.

TAYLOR—Johnson Pope Taylor, a resident of Cottage Grove since 1888, died at his home Friday morning at 10 o'clock a. m.

For a long time Mr. Taylor had been a sufferer with a cancerous growth from which he has been unable to obtain relief.

He was born in Buchanan county, Mo., in 1847, where he resided until he went to Kansas, where he married Miss Clara Lane.

Besides I. J. Taylor, an elder brother who lives in the city, his wife and adopted son Orville Taylor are left to mourn his loss.

The funeral services were held at the Christian church at 10 o'clock this morning, the Rev. Billington preached the sermon. He was buried by the Odd Fellows of which order he was a valued member.

Professor Stafford Selected.

At a meeting held at the Commercial Club rooms Wednesday night the committee sent to Eugene to confer with the committee at that place in reference to arranging for a suitable man to take charge of the Bohemia and Blue river mineral exhibits at the Lewis and Clark fair, reported that Prof. Stafford of the Oregon University had been selected, but that he could not go until the latter part of June. A committee consisting of Frank Jordan, J. I. Jones and Chas. Bruenau was appointed to arrange for funds for the carrying on of this work.

Siuslaw Cougar Killed.

Mr. C. J. Miller of this city was the first of the week visiting over on the Siuslaw and upon his return relates the killing of a large cougar.

While an old gentlemen by the name of Farming, was, about dark on Tuesday night, driving home the cows and when within a quarter of a mile of the house he saw a large cougar creeping along and before he could prevent, it sprang upon and killed a sheep. Mr. Farming although unarmed frightened the animal away and soon reported the occurrence at the house. A party with dogs was soon gathered and in a short time the dogs had the cougar in a tree. It was by this time too dark to see the cougar, so the party camped right on the spot until daylight when it was shot. It proved to be a large one but very poor.
