The water supply is getting very short, and while they will allow all the use of it that is possible and leave a sufficient quantity stored for fire emergencies, yet some certain hours must be set for irrigation. For that purpose the council has decreed that at noon the City bell will strike 24 taps with a pause between each four. On the day the West Side bell strikes 24 taps at noon, the people on that side of the City may use the water for irrigation of flowers and plants, from 7 to 8 P. M. of that day, and that day only; when the East Side bell rings 24 taps they may water their flowers and plants from 7 to 8 P. M. of that same evening and that one only.

When the new system is installed many of these precautions will not be necessary.
