Coos County, remote, mountain-locked and isolated from the rest of the state, has made the most ambitious and elaborate exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Exposition of all the counties of Oregon. Coos county's building at the Exposition is one of which a state might be proud. That a single county has erected it and filled it with an exhibit so worthy is remarkable. The people of Coos County have given ample demonstration at the Exposition of unusual enterprise and of ability to rise superior to obstacles. Watch Coos County. It is a "comer."

There is a strong probability that the City of Portland will acquire at least a portion of the Lewis and Clark Fairgrounds for park purposes. All that is lacking is a bond issue to provide the necessary funds for the city has the right to condemn property for park purposes, thus preventing speculators from forcing up the price. That the Forestry building will be permanently maintained by the city is considered assured, and the Lewis and Clark Memorial building, to be erected at a cost of \$100,000, is to contain the museum and a permanent exhibit. It is believed the Portland Consolidated Railway Company will donate the site for the latter building, which is to be erected at the close of the Exposition and presented to the city, the state paying half the cost of the construction, while the Lewis and Clark Fair Corporation pays the other half.

Eugene Local and Freight Trains Barely Escape Head-on Smash.

Eugene, Ore., July 19.—The story of what came near being a serious railroad collision near Irving, six miles north of Eugene, last Saturday morning, has just leaked out. The conductor and engineer on the Eugene local, two of the oldest men in the service of the Southern Pacific Company, missed their "meet" after leaving here at 6 o'clock for Portland. It is said that the local had orders to meet a freight train at Irving, but the order was overlooked and there was a narrow escape from a head-on collision. It is said that both trains were running toward each other at full speed and were stopped only a few feet apart. The fact that they were running on a straight track on an open prairie prevented a serious catastrophe.

JURORS ARE DISCHARGED

Stand Ten to Two for Conviction of Gesner, Biggs and Williamson.

O. H. Flook, a farmer of Olalla, Douglas county, and G. O. Walker, of Walker, Lane county, are the two jurors who persistently refused to vote for the guilt of the defendants in the Williamson-Gesner-Biggs case, causing disagreement of the jury and retrial. It is said they offered to vote guilty against Gesner and Biggs if the other jurors would declare Congressman Williamson innocent, but this the majority would not do. Walker is a constituent of State Senator R. A. Booth, while Flook is a constituent of Binger Hermann. Both are said to be personal friends of Heumann.

After being closeted together for 46 hours and taking 42 ballots, in which the vote was ten for conviction and two for acquittal, the jury in the Williamson-Gesner-Biggs case reported to Judge De Haven in the United States Circuit Court at 1 o'clock yesterday morning that it could not agree and was discharged. Judge De Haven asked each juror individually whether there was any hope of an agreement, to which each responded there was not. The Court then ordered the clerk to enter an order of dismissal.

District Attorney Heney asked that this case might be made to follow the Jones case, or in the event the Jones case should not come to trial, he would like to try the Williamson case over at once. Judge De Haven then took occasion virtually to decide the demurrer to the Jones indictment by saying that he would probably not be tried, as he was satisfied of the insufficiency of the indictment. District Attorney Heney said he would rather not go to trial on the indictment, if there was any question in the mind of the Court as to its insufficiency.

The Williamson case was then set for today.

An Oregon Man Gains Promotion.

The squabble in Venezuela ended in the clearing of the diplomatic decks and the placing of W. W. Russell, formerly minister to Columbia, as representative of the United States at Bogota, and the filling of the berth by John Barrett. With the removal of Bowen from Venezuela, the United States has taken away the element of personal feeling in the trouble between the two countries, or rather between Venezuela and the asphalt trust, and an amicable arrangement will eventually be reached.

The diplomatic change involved in this method of peace-making has brought John Barrett once more prominently before the public. This young man of restless proclivities, who claims Oregon as his home, has filled many difficult positions in the diplomatic corps, not having received the plums, such as European courts, but the out-of-the-way places, such as Siam and Argentine. Removed to Panama, he upheld his dignity among a class of officials who were inclined to disregard him, and when his usefulness there was ended, it seemed for a short time as if his career were to end. He was easily the most prominent diplomat assigned to posts outside of Europe, and there was no outside left to him.
