The Dog License.

Cottage Grove, Ore., Aug. 3, 05.
Editor Leader.—Considerable agitation is manifest in this city regarding the dog license. This is a dog town, in fact, some one has dubbed it dog town. But with all sincerity we have many dogs, and now as in times past they frequent the streets to the disgust, annoyances and oftentimes danger of the pedestrian.

The council has labored long and earnestly to find ways and means by which the town can be made rid of this nuisance. In this the council is to be applauded. Now about the result. Previous to this year the dog license was fixed at a nominal sum. The majority of tax owners paid the amount and the dogs still held possession of the streets and walks. This year the license has been increased to \$3. Those who are able, particularly those who own from two to a dozen dogs, have paid and are now paying there increased license, while the man or boy in moderate circumstances, who perchance, owns some little house dog under lock and chain, must in this disregard the law, dispose of the dog or strain their financial resources. And yet the streets are over run with dogs. As I understand the case the motive of the council and the present high license was imposed with a view of keeping dogs from the streets. But it does not keep them from the streets. It appears to act to the reverse. I do not believe we should license dogs to run on the streets. Why not impose a nominal license of 50 cents or \$1. on every dog in town—a license that every dog owner will be glad to pay—and then have an ordinance restraining dogs from running at large, imposing pound fee to be collected from the owner, and fee to be paid in 10 days from the time the dog is confined in the city pound. We have an ordinance forbidding cows, chickens, etc. from running at large. Why not an ordinance covering dogs? Would this not be a solution of the question?

WILLIAMETTE UNIVERSITY NEW BUILDING.

Salmon, Ore., Aug. 3.—Bids were opened last evening for the construction of a new medical college for the Williamette University, on the University campus, and although a large number of bids were received the contract will be awarded to contractor H. N. Hye, for \$11,870, some time today, and everything signed up. The intention of this finance committee, which has the matter in hand, is to have the work of construction begin at the earliest possible date that the building may be ready for occupancy before winter sets in. The building will be a handsome structure of pressed brick with two stories and a basement.

Game Law Arrests.

Curry county.—Long.—Hoyt, O. B. Lamb, Geo. Forty, were fined \$25 and costs each for killing deer out of season.
W. S. Houser, J. T. Jeffrey, Wm. Horn, and R. G. McLaughlin entered a plea of guilty also but the Justice of the Peace refused to fine them. The Sheriff of the county is going to try to bring action against the Justice for not fining the men that plead guilty. The arrests were made by Deputy J. D. Wilson.

Pendleton, Ore., is having a closed town on Sunday now with a vengeance. The council passed an ordinance that, as one paper expresses it, practically the only thing permitted to be open will be the churches and funerals. The ordinance was adopted by the council at the instance of those who are opposed to the closing of saloons on Sundays, and is designed to close out every form of business out of revenge for the enforcement of the Sunday closing law, against saloons. The law will work its own undoing and those that pushed it will lose by their own struggle.

The Bonnington Investigation.

San Diego, Aug. 2.—"I can assure you there will be no whitewashing in any particular in this proceeding," was the statement of Admiral Connelley this morning, referring to the investigation by the board of inquiry into the cause of the Bonnington explosion. Either the Solars of the wreck, now on the way to France, will be ordered here to take the investigation, or, as Marc Island, The Bonnington and Bonnington will remain here until that time. There are no new deaths and the patients are all doing well.—Star.

When the electrodes were brought in contact with about an inch square of the wall of the organ the galvanometer registered nearly ten milli-volts of direct electrical current. It is claimed that this action proves that the whole process of indigestion in an electro-chemic one; also that this current in the walls of the stomach prevents the digestion of the stomach by its juices.
