A. W. Zinkler, owner of the Mineral King mine on Horseheaven Creek, Bohemia is in the city for a few days. Mr. Zinkler is a stayer and has accomplished much good work with results that increase his faith in Bohemia, and encourage him to hope for large things.

There was a slight accident to one of the boys in the bottling plant at London on Monday. As he was filling a bottle it exploded, the flying glass cutting his arm quite badly, however he will be back to work in a few days. The plant is putting up about 1500 bottles a day.

The Eugene Guard seems to think that the Southern Pacific Company is making improvements there that it is not doing elsewhere. They don't seem to know that we are to have a modern watering plant here also, and so arranged that the engines can tank up while standing at the depot.

Business is getting so brisk over at London that they find it necessary to start the Stage to running daily from the Oregon Mineral Springs Association Hotel to take care of the people stopping there. There is always room for more, so the managers say, and when the hotel is full they provide good clean tents, nicely fixed up.

The creamery is getting along very nicely. Mr. Stiller had hoped to have it running by the 15th, but has been so delayed for lack of lumber that they will probably not be able to get it done for several weeks yet. The machinery is all on the ground and building is ready for the ceiling. The well is being dug and as soon as the building is finished the machinery will be put in place and started.

In the exhibit of the United States Government at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, there is a building devoted to Forestry and Irrigation. In it are many things, which are of particular great importance to those who like the delegates to the coming session of the Irrigation Congress, are interested in these two closely connected subjects. Paper mache models of a number of the irrigation projects which the Government has under consideration, photographs showing the effects of forest denudation and the methods of and necessity for reforestation, as well as a thousand and one other most interesting things, have been gathered under the direction of Mr. Sewell, the Chief of the Reclamation Service.

Although the existence of natural gas in this country had been known for many years, it was not produced in quantities sufficient to warrant statistical treatment until during the decade ending with 1890. The reports of the eleventh census are the first in which the industry is presented. The number of wells producing at the close of Dec. 1889, was given as 2,247, and the amount received for the gas consumed as \$14,044.858. The value of the fuel displaced computed at \$21,097,099 including that displaced by gas used at oil pipe line stations, in pumping and drilling oil wells, and for other uses. This was regarded as the actual value. The value given for 1902 is the amount received from the sale of the gas.

The printers shop itself has been badly laid up for this reason, having to send clear to Portland, and wait for a week even then for a piece of simple lathe work.

Every one took a good sized basket along, and lunch was spread on one great table, every one helping themselves to what they liked best. The recital given by the pupils of Mrs. Roy Welch on Thursday night was very good, the pupils showing the advantage of having a good teacher. The Wildwood Lumber Co. mill shut down Tuesday for about a couple of weeks, letting out about 15 or 20 men, some of whom left the camp immediately. The mill has run out of dry logs, and as has been the plan for some time the Company is raising the natural dam at that point in the Row river, and cutting a flume through from there to the mill. After this is done, which will take about two weeks they will be in shape to keep a steady force of men at work, and will make the capacity much greater. The cement flume is well under way now, and active work will commence at once on the dam and pond.

Rev. J. C. Wooley a returned missionary from Japan, spent Sun. and Mon. with Rev. Wm. Grace. Sunday evening he gave an illustrated lecture on the missionary work in the "Island Empire of the Orient." Showing many beautiful scenes, idols, Pagodas and the home life of the missionaries and of the natives. On Monday evening Mr. Wooley gave an illustrated lecture on a trip "Around the World" and again he showed some very beautiful scenes of Japan. He dwelt at length on the "Holy Land" giving many beautiful pictures of that distant country. Mr. Wooley spent several weeks in Palestine on his way back to Japan. He said that he had stood on the ground where the things of the past had occurred. He also gives some very beautiful pictures of Cairo, the Pyramids and other scenes of Egypt. When he reached the "Home Land" the audience united in singing the song "America" while scene after scene was shown on the canvas that would awake a patriotic line of a country. One thing that interested the audience Monday evening was a conversation between Mr. Wooley and one of our Japanese residents. Mr. Wooley starts for the East this week and hopes soon to return to the Orient.

The Structural iron for the new So. Pacific tanks is on hand as well as the gasoline engines to run the pump. The diggers are down 39 ft. with the wells, but have struck no flow of water sufficient to supply demands. They are about to begin boring in hopes that they can reach a good supply that way without having to sink the shaft deeper.

The Creamery has received its ceiling, and is getting ready to install the machinery. The farmers better be getting ready to deliver the cream before so very long. The fact that the farmers in many instances own their own separators makes it not only better for the creamery by not having to bother with the milk, but it makes less work for the farmers hauling to and from the creamery, and very greatly lessens the work of the farmers help in taking care of the milk. The separators are cheap enough, when one considers their daily use, that a farmer that milks a few cows can hardly afford to be without one. The creamery expects to be in shape to not only do a big business, but to turn out good fine butter. They have just gotten a good flow of water at 27 feet down.
