The Creamery is having a hard time to get cream enough to operate its plant, so that it has been found necessary to start a collecting wagon. One route goes to Creswell and another to Lorane, and will probably result in considerably more cream being gathered up. Many farmers have separators, and use them in making their own butter. They could get more money for their cream by selling it than they can by making their own butter, and save themselves the work too, but they do not seem to think that such is the case. A good trial with keeping accurate records of both ways would soon show the fact that it was a great saving to sell the cream. Some farmers of course think that because their neighbor with cattle on the same kind of land as their own gets a higher percentage of butter fat goes to prove that there is fault in the creamery, while the difference usually lies in the separators. One farmer gets all the cream out of his milk and consequently gets a small amount of high percentage butter fat, another only part of the butter fat, consequently to get the same amount of butter fat as his neighbor he must sell a very much larger quantity of his low percentage cream.

If both separators were set the same, the pasturage the same, and the cows the same, the butter fat percentage would be alike or nearly so. A fair trial is needed by all farmers to prove the fact. Careful feeding and proper separation giving about 30 per cent butter fat is the best. Give the Creamery a fair trial, farmers, and if you do so once, you will keep it up, a check at the end of each month would seem pretty good.

Russia Hasn't Got Enough Yet—Resumes Transportation of Troops to Front.

Chicago, Aug. 24.—According to a special cablegram to the Daily News from St. Petersburg. Mr. Witte's mission at Portsmouth is considered ended and a rupture is expected at once. The dispatching of troops and provisions to the scene of war in the Far East has been vigorously resumed, and a special Minister of Siberian Railroads and Waterways has been appointed.

"Nobody," he says, "shares in the optimism of the government." A General recently returned from Manchuria is quoted in an interview today as saying:

"The coming campaign will be

of short duration. The numerical increase in the armies will only impede the retreat which Linieutch must make, because victory is impossible. The soldiers are demoralized and disciplined, the chiefs incapable, distrusted and disliked." He continued:

"The claim that Japan has reached and passed its climax and is now exhausted is ridiculous. The Japanese are gaining strength in proportion as we are losing. Any delay will only increase the price of peace."

If Mr. Witte withdraws from the Portsmouth conference rather than admit of the payment of indemnity and cession of Sakhalin, it will go to show that the original instruction given by the Czar have been changed, and that it is the intention to push the campaign as vigorously as possible. Such a proceeding will be of great result to Russia, for should she fail in her military and naval conflicts, when it comes again to a peace conference Japan, will be able to lay down almost any terms they see fit and Russia will have to accept them. Russia would like nothing better than to have peace declared, with some of the important question unsettled, so that after a time war could be resumed, for in the meantime Russia would do everything in her power to strengthen her forces, and get ready to wipe the Japs off the globe, this Japan is looking out for and is not going to allow any half way settlement.

Portland Damaged by Fire.

Aug. 22.—A fire started in the kitchen of the Iowa Hotel restaurant on the East Side about 6 in the morning and destroyed one entire block, and three half block adjoining. The fire soon got under the flooring and destroyed the roadways adding greatly to the disaster. The loss was not as heavy as might have been owing to the nature of the buildings of the section. \$100,000 will probably cover the entire losses. The city and county will lose considerable through the destruction of the approach to the Oak St. bridge, and the fall of the sewer suspended under the roadway. The raised wooden street platforms caused the most trouble, and will probably result in fills being made this time.

Big Fire on the Mohawk.

Austin Root, a forest ranger in the employ of Booth-Kelly Co., the Weyerhaeuser and Wentworth lumber companies reports that J. B. Willoughby, who has a ranch on the upper Mohawk, after securing a permit to set out fires on Aug. 18, did not watch them as he should have done, and the fire has spread so as to destroy the timber on several hundred acres of land, and considerable quantity of saw logs belonging to the Booth-Kelly Co. Mr. Willoughby has been arrested and with undoubtedly be prosecuted for not properly watching the fires as proscribed by law.

Building a Large Silo.

Those who have had the handling of cattle know something of the benefit of green feed for milch cows during the winter season. Sam Howard, who lives about three or four miles northeast of Eugene, and who is in the dairy business for what there is in it, is making preparations to feed ensilage when everybody else will be feeding dry hay. He is making an immense silo on his place and is having large iron rods, twenty-three feet in length made to build it together. If the venture proves satisfactory he will make a large one next year.
