Cooked to Death

Butte, Mont., Sept. 6.—Telegraphic advices received from Livingston tell of the horrible death of Miss Fannie Wicks of Washington, District of Columbia, who was literally boiled alive in one of the hot springs in Yellowstone park and expired ere she could be taken from the seething liquid.

Miss Wicks was touring the park with her family and with them was watching the geyser. As it started to spout the young woman stepped backward and fell into the scalding spring, where she was cooked to death.

Leaders of Woman's Suffrage in Oregon say They Will Win.

Leaders in the Woman's Suffrage movement in this state feel confident of securing the 8000 signatures required for their petition in order to allow them to place the subject before the people at the next general election. Mrs. Lyman J. Trumbull, president of the Astoria organization, states that of 300 signatures assigned to Clatsop County, 215 have already been secured, with six petitions yet to hear from.

Miss Gregg, president of the State Association of Equal Suffrage in Nebraska, will come to Portland to take part in the campaign. She is conceded one of the best organizers in the movement, and is an eloquent convincing speaker. Miss Gregg will remain here until after the June election. She will have charge of the work in the rural districts.

Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt will come to Portland early in January, and remaining until after the election, will direct the work from this city. The petitions being circulated here for the necessary signatures, are being largely signed. Dr. Johnson, a member of the local Woman's Union Label League, has charge of the work among the trade Unions, and has been addressing the various meetings almost every night creating much interest.—Telegram.

Wealthy Chicagoan Beats Wife at a Party and Fatally Wounds Young Son.

Chicago, Sept. 6.—After stabbing and probably fatally wounding his son, who interfered to save his mother from him, Peter A. Achten a business man of Chicago, led the infuriated crowd which witnessed the stabbing a wild chase from his summer house at Camp Lake, and was captured only after he had emptied his revolver at his pursuers. He was taken to Kenosha today where he was arraigned before Justice George McCarron, who continued the case 10 days. He was placed in jail, failing to procure bonds.

Young Achten is in a critical condition from a stab wound in the arm and another just above the heart. The fight occurred Sunday night during a house party Achten was giving some Chicagoans, about 20 in number, at his Camp Lake house, where they live during the summer.

Eugene Factory Canning Pears

The Allen cannery is now busy canning, and is working full time on Bartlett pears. The pear season will last about 10 days, after which the factory will commence on prunes. About 70 people are being kept busy and about 300 cases are being prepared each day. The total output of pears will be over 3000 cases. The quantity of pears is about one fourth of the usual crop.

Harrison & Co. believes that the flour now being shipped to Japan from Pacific coast ports in sacks bearing no brands, is a way the wily orientals have chosen to evade living up to the restrictions of the boycott ordered placed on American products.
