An examination he reported that his bones were broken, and the bruises were very bad. He thought **Mr. Rouse** would be able to be moved in about a week for 10 days and then could be brought home, and would soon be able to get on his feet. He thinks that there are serious internal injuries. **Mrs. Rouse** who has been spending the winter at the camp came down a few days Sunday, going to the hop yard near **Creswell**. As quick as she heard of the accident, **Mr. John Rouse**, the father of **Mrs. Rouse**, got a team and drove to **Creswell** for her, bringing her back to the **Grove**. A fresh team was ready to take her to camp. They did not get there until after four, but drove to the camp and got to the camp at just about the morning. The last thing he is that he is resting well, very hopeful, which is a very good thing.

The east wing of the **Helena** saloon building is being cut off to allow of the west party wall of the **Bartels** Meat Market being built on the line. The cement and rock are both on hand, and the building will be rapidly pushed to completion.

The market will be finely equipped, with a cold storage plant for the proper care of the meats. A cement floor will cover the entire room. Everything that can be done will be done to make the market thoroughly up-to-date in every respect.

Two carloads of the wooden pipes for the water works system are on hand, and **Contractor Lea** says that the pipe laying will progress rapidly now. The first work done will be to lay the lines across the river, so as to be ready should any flood water come down. Most of the ditches are dug, the dam sites are cleared and before the month is out, most of the pipes will be laid and connected. A carload of cement came in Wednesday to be used in the construction of the various dams.

There is some more water in the streams now than there has been and the contractors working on the dams are anxious to get them finished before enough rain falls to interfere with the work.

Before the mill started to sawing lumber it was working for some time planing and finishing some lumber on hand. They are looking for more men that they may enlarge the force at the **Alca mill**.
