LEADERS IN GENERAL MERCHANDISING

Says Race Suicide is Good Thing.

Pittsburg Philanthropic women take exception to President Roosevelt's race suicide theory. Mrs. S. E. Lippincott, superintendent and secretary of the Society for the Improvement of the Poor, after a consultation with other members of the society, has decided to write to Mrs. Roosevelt asking her to persuade the president to modify his position. This determination crystallized today, when a woman who has been deserted by her husband and was penniless applied for aid. She was the mother of 17 children, seven of whom were dead "and happy." Another is in the institution for feeble-minded. Although reduced to extreme poverty by the desertion of her husband, the woman wants to apply to the president for a medal as an example of an ideal wife and mother. Mrs. Lippincott said.

"What, with the wretchedness of and distress of big families raised by the shiftless poor, and equally large families brought by immigrants to this country and the menace they are to the nation and society, I purpose write to Mrs. Roosevelt, in an appeal to her womanhood against the indiscriminate applauding of unwelcome conditions."
