Wm. J. Bryan and Family Sail for the Orient.

San Francisco, Sept. 27.—William Jennings Bryan, Mrs. Bryan, their son and their youngest daughter sailed today on the Manchuria for the Orient. They will stop for a time on the Hawaiian islands and expect to reach Yokohama about October 15.

Just before sailing Mr. Bryan said: "I may want to stay some time in Japan and will also make an extensive tour through the Philippines. It is probable that from there I shall go to Australia and New Zealand. In India I have planned to make an investigation of the English method of dealing with colonies. When we leave there we shall go up the Nile to the Holy Land. Then I intend to make a thorough tour of the European continent. I intend to stay for some time in every country. The entire journey will take about one year."

Mr. Bryan has published the following parting letter:

"To President Roosevelt: Permit a parting word. You have the contest of your life before you and I desire to render you all the assistance in my power. You have asked congress to enact a law enlarging the powers of the interstate commerce commission so as to permit it to enforce and fix freight rates. The railroad magnates expect to block the passage of the bill again.

"Stand by your guns. You have developed a reform element in the republican party; you must lead it or suffer the humiliation of seeing the leadership pass to some one else. "Go forward. You owe it to yourself; you owe it to your party and more than all you owe it to your country.

Large Flour Order Placed.

Seattle, Sept. 26.—An order for 180,000 barrels of flour to be delivered immediately, has been placed with a local mill by Vladivostok flour merchants. This is the largest single order ever placed on the Pacific Coast.

Three special steamers have been chartered to carry this shipment. The first will sail October 5, the second October 20, and the third early in November. All are expected to get out of Vladivostok before ice begins to form in the harbor. New orders for Hongkong and Shanghai delivery are being received, and all orders placed before the boycott was proclaimed have been confirmed.

Getting Ready for Primary.

Salem.—Secretary of State Dunbar began this morning to make preparations for the general primary election to be held in this state April 20.

The petitions of all candidates for state and district offices must be filed with the Secretary of State by April 1, in order to have a place on the official ballot.

It will require at least 60 days for each candidate or his friends to secure the necessary names and prepare the petitions required by law so that his name appears on the official ballot.

The tally sheets will contain space for recording the vote for at least 60 candidates for each party in every county in the state. Two tally sheets will be prepared: One for the Republican party and one for the Democratic party. No other party cast sufficient votes at the last election to entitle it to recognition in the primary election.

Secretary Dunbar placed an order with the State Printer for 32,380 blanks to be delivered by January 1. The estimated cost of the primary election is between \$35,000 and \$40,000.

Norway-Sweden Protocol.

Stockholm, Sept. 25.—The text of the protocol has been signed at Karlstad by the Norwegian and Swedish commissioners and announced. The first article deals with arbitration, the second with a neutral zone and demilitarization of fortifications, the third with reindeer pastures, fourth inter-traffic and fifth with common waterways. The agreement calls for compulsory arbitration before The Hague tribunal of all disputes except of those of vital interests for a decade. There must be two years' notice of intention to abrogate.

Fight Revolver Duel for 20 Miles in Closed Express Car.

Decatur, Ill., Sept. 27.—While the train was running 50 miles an hour a fatal duel was fought in a closed express car of the east-bound passenger on the Wabash from Bement, Illinois, to this city this morning between J. E. Ryan, express messenger, and a former messenger named Greene.

Greene entered the express car at Bement and the men began quarreling over an old grievance, which is said to have originated from Ryan's appointment as successor to Greene. Greene accused Ryan of having undermined his standing with the company, which Ryan denied. Blows followed and Greene was knocked down. Arising he pulled out a revolver and shot Ryan slightly wounding him.

Ryan pulling out his own revolver, shot at Greene. Each hastily barricaded himself behind express packages and continued firing at the other from the two ends of the car. For the entire 20 miles shots were exchanged, more than 50 empty shells being found in the car.

When the car reached this city trainmen hearing the continued shooting, forced open the door of the car and found both combatants warily eyeing each other from behind their barricades. Both were bleeding profusely, being badly wounded in many places.

Gunboat is Lost in Typhoon.

Washington.—General Corbin telegraphs from Manila that the typhoon of yesterday caused great damage throughout the Philippine islands as well as in Manila. Thousands of natives in remote sections are homeless and many towns completely demolished. The wires are down and the full extent of the damage is unknown.

The government post at Malahi was totally destroyed, but so far as known there were no casualties. Admiral Reiter cables that the gunboat Leite was lost in the storm. No one was aboard of her at the time. The craft was captured from Spain and was practically worthless.

In Manila 10,000 persons were homeless. Six persons are known to have been killed and more than 200 injured. The wind reached a velocity of 105 miles an hour. Hundreds of stone buildings were blown down and workmen are busy today removing the debris from the streets. It is thought that many dead will be found in the ruins of the demolished buildings. Shipping in the region swept by the typhoon was warned in time to get clear of its path. The property loss is estimated at \$500,000 in Manila.
