The price of \$1000 offered for the best county exhibit was distributed among Lane, Marion, Coos, Linn, Umatilla and Wasco counties. The second award of \$500 was divided among Clackamas, Columbia, Jackson, Polk and Morrow counties, and the third of \$300 went

to Benton, Yamhill, Malheur, Union and Baker counties. There are seven claimants for the fourth award of \$200—Wallowa, Washington, Sherman, Josephine, Lincoln, Harney and Douglas counties.

### Church Union.

The Union of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A. and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church was decided last May by the vote of the General Assembly of these two churches affirmatively and only the details are to be carried out, but to make these two great organizations one body. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church of Cottage Grove took all the necessary steps Monday evening, and by a unanimous vote of the congregation unite with the Presbyterian Church and on Tuesday the Willamette Presbytery, U. S. A. received that body under its care at its regular session at Salem, and as this action is properly safeguarded in all its legal aspects the Cumberland Presbyterian Church of this city is now the Presbyterian Church of Cottage Grove, and all Presbyterians and Cumberland Presbyterians are expected to co-operate in the work. This is a step in the right way and it is hoped that all Presbyterians who have not identified themselves with the church here will do so at once. There is now no reason why they should not do so, they now have a church here. The pastor and the bench of elders will most heartily welcome all such. It is all right to visit with your friends until your own home is established, but after that your friends would expect you to go to your own household. ## GREEKS IN RIOT.

83 Greeks. Section Men Engaged in Laying New Rails on the S. P. Engage in Fight and Mrs. John A. Petersein, Wife of the Foreman of the Gang is Killed, and One Greek is Badly Wounded.

Tuesday night at eleven o'clock a south bound freight train, in going into the siding at Glenbrook to allow the passenger to pass, jolted quite severely the cars occupied by the Greek crew who are laying new rails along the road. When the jolting occurred the Greeks got very angry, rushed from their cars with guns and revolvers and made for the freight train, the crew of which consisted of Engineer J. L. Woodson, Fireman Jesse McCulloch, Conductor, Fred Gollings, and Brakemen C. E. Johnson and F. J. Birmingham. Woodson and McCulloch were driven from the engine by a fusillade and the rest were obliged to flee for safety. Johnson went to a house near by and got a rifle and returned to the scene and did some shooting on his own account, wounding one of the Greeks and causing the rest to disperse. About this time foreman Petersein, and his wife attracted by the shooting went to the doorway of their car and peered out into the darkness and assistant foreman Thos. Scott joined them. Suddenly three shots rang out, two of them barely missed Scott's head and the third struck Mrs. Peterson in the right eye killing her instantly. Who fired the shots is a mystery. It is thought that the shot was intended for her husband.

As soon as the news of the riot reached Roseburg the Deputy Sheriff Bogard and Marshal Jarvis left for the scene with a posse of 28 men who had no difficulty in arresting the Greeks and putting them in some box cars and taking them to Roseburg where they were placed in the Josephson Warehouse under guard of the state militia called out by Judge M. D. Thompson at the request of the sheriff.

The coroner took charge of the case and is trying to get some evidence as to who fired the fatal shot with little success as yet.

Mrs. Petersein was buried Thursday afternoon at the I. O. O. F. cemetery there.

The Adjutant Attorney General has approved the action of the judge in calling out the state militia.

### Teachers' Institute Meeting.

Eugene, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, and the program was even better than expected. Interesting addresses and lectures were given by men of note, J. H. Akerman, Prof. D. W. Yoder of University of Washington, Pres. P. L. Campbell and Prof. H. D. Sheldon of the State University, W. G. Hartranft, and others.

### Creswell Building New Church.

Rev. Green, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Creswell, has announced that the new church will be finished in time for the Thanksgiving services, and free from debt. The church building will be 58 feet square, will seat 300 people in the auditorium, and 75 or 80 in the lecture room. The building will cost about \$2000.

### AT FAIR

Officers and Stockholders day at Fair.

Today is the last day of the great Lewis and Clark Fair, an enterprise which has done much for the betterment of the great state of Oregon and the northwest at large. It is altogether fitting that the last day be named in tribute to the officers and stockholders of the Company which has made the fair so great a success.

The attendance has been the largest proportionally of any fair of the kind held. The exhibits have been of a very fine character, and architecture of the buildings, the landscape architecture, the whole fair has been the work of master minds, and it is a great thing for Portland and the state that some portions of it are to remain as permanent improvements. The total attendance will be over 2600,000.

### Shot Companion for a Bear.

Two young men, Leo Hoselton and Frank Edmiston of Eugene went for a bear hunt above Cedar Flats, and separated in order to round up the bear. Young Edmiston was stationed at a given point, and after a time seeing what he thought was a bear, fired twice with his 30-30. It turned out to be Hoselton returning, and he was struck in the mouth, breaking the lower jaw bone near the hinge and came out just under and back of the ear, while a part of the bullet came out further back. The other bullet broke the fore arm about two inches above the elbow. Young Edmiston ran to a logging camp and got help to bring the man to town, where his wounds were dressed. He is staying at the home of his father-in-law, Mr. Cartright, and at the latest reports was getting along nicely.



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
