### Libraries for Rural Districts.

Salem, Or., Oct. 18.—Miss Cornelia Marvin, secretary of the State Library Board, is arranging circulating libraries to be sent to several rural districts. Owing to the fact that the legislature did not provide any money for the purchase of books, Miss Marvin has to depend on the generosity of friends of the movement to provide libraries. Thirty states maintain state library boards, and purchase books for circulation among the people. Of the Western states, California has 120 libraries, with 6000 volumes; Colorado, 122 libraries, with 6000 volumes; Idaho 100 libraries, with 6000 volumes. In these states all the books are purchased by state appropriations. It is the ambition of Miss Marvin so to demonstrate the utility of circulating libraries that when the next legislature meets there will be no difficulty in procuring an appropriation large enough to enable the board to put at least 50 libraries in circulation.
