SUNDAY CLOSING.

To us it seems strange that a small town finds so much objection to the order of the mayor closing business houses on Sunday in accordance with the law, when nine-tenths of the cities of the United States have found it for their best interests to do the same.

It is not considered class legislation elsewhere, why should it be so here. It is considered sound business, and based on the best of experience.

No business man, or any other man can say, and prove up his statement, that he will sell less goods during a year when such a law is in force than he would a year when it was not. The men who run the stores need a rest as well as any body. It may at first inconvenience some would-be Sunday traders, because they have gotten into the habit of doing their trading on that day, but after a very short time they will become just as accustomed to doing their trading on week days, as anybody else.

If other towns can prosper under such rule, why not Cottage Grove, we want to have as good a name as any other town, and it certainly is against a town to be known as open on the year round, every day, with hardly a half day's exception, even on national holidays.

The Register and Guard are at it hammer and tongs, again, this time, however, the caption is entitled "Simplex versus Linotype."

Holland is said to be considering the establishment of a Republic, on account of the antipathy of the nation to the persons coming in the line of succession to the crown, should Queen Wilhelmina fail to have a son.

Poor Count Boni's troubles are overtaking him for good this time, it seems. And he deserves a thousand times more trouble than he will get. At present it looks as though the Countess would not only leave him, but refuse to give him any support.

We hope our sister city can get the germs located and lassoed, so that she can have as good a record as ourselves. However, it behooves us to use every precaution known, to keep our city clean, to purify our water and not give any such trouble a start.

Portland paid \$20,000 for five nights of grand opera and would have gladly paid twice as much, says the Journal. It is several years since we have heard the Savage Company, but we have heard Miss Martha Miner who took the part of Elsa, and Miss Margaret Crawford, who sang the part of Ortrud in Lohengrin, within a year, and know how fine they are. It always pays to hear good grand opera, and the Savage Company is good, but not of course anywhere near the equal of the Grau Company, with the Metropolitan Grand Opera Troupe of New York, which someone is to be heard in the west.

In the Oregonian of last Sunday there appeared a news article which shows very clearly the situation in the Congressional contest in Marion county.
