Important Every Day Happenings.

Multnomah County has only 9,437 voters registered so far, out of an expected registration of 22,000 for the primaries and 25,000 for the regular election.

Prof. Samuel P. Langley, a noted scientist, died at Aitken, S. C. Tuesday of paralysis. While his whole life has been devoted to scientific work, his later years have been given to astronomy and flying machines. He has made a number of public experiments that were watched with much interest all over the world.

Albert T. Patrick, the New York lawyer convicted of murder of a client, has lost ground in his argument for a new trial, through the self-confessed perjury of one of his principal witnesses in his behalf.

The State Land Board has cancelled a number of land certificates alleging fraud, through the land operator now under conviction, A. T. Kellihier. A number of such certificates have recently been turned down, and many contests are being prepared, against the Board's decisions. We hope the state can win out, for the men that purchased the supposed fraudulent certificates, ought to have satisfied themselves thoroughly before they took any chances.

An important decision was made in Chicago courts Tuesday when Judge Lyndis of the U. S. Circuit court decided that the Interstate Commerce Commission could compel witnesses to answer questions. The case in point was where the president of a private car line was asked to answer the question "What part of the mileage from whatever source have you given up to shippers during the past six months?"

The declaration to answer was fought with the result that answer is compelled, which tends to prove that the governmental provisions allows the Interstate Commerce Commission to govern private car rebates.
