Blue Ribbons in Plenty.

Mrs. J. H. Warner has just received a coop of 1 cockerel and 16 hens, all Silver Grey Dorkings. Four of the hens and the cockerel took high prizes at the Lewis and Clark Exposition and also at Corvallis and Newberg. These chickens are of a very large build, with short legs and are five toed, their color is dark grey, but the rooster shows almost none of the grey, the under part of the body being white, and the upper, black and white, and silver grey. He is as big as many fair sized turkeys.

They are all very tame, and are easily reared and are considered first class layers. Mrs. Warner's brother raised them at Amity.

Mrs. Warner has now 28 Silver Spangled Hamburg chicks four weeks old and 117 five days old. Her two incubators holding about 170 eggs are going constantly and she hopes to raise at least 400 chicks this season. The chicken yard being so small Mrs. Warner says that she is going to get a small farm, where she can have lots of room for them, and will devote her time to raising chickens and lots of them too.

Kaiser's Bottom Farmer Makes Money From Alfalfa Fed Hogs.

Albany, Or., March 7.—Harvey E. Lounsbury, traveling freight agent for the Southern Pacific, and nicknamed "the Granger," for the reason that he is paying particular attention to the farming and stock-growing of the valley, was at Kaiser's Bottom, on the Willamette river, four miles below Salem, yesterday, inspecting the alfalfa fields of Fred Achilles, who is making a success of hogs fattened on alfalfa. On the Achilles' farm was found a 12-acre piece of alfalfa, four years old, in the bottom, and a 17-acre field, three years old, on the upland. Mr. Achilles last year, from May 1 to October 31, kept from 150 to 175 hogs on the 12-acre tract of alfalfa. He bought the pigs when they weighed 60 pounds each and sold them after six months weighing from 180 to 200 pounds each. Only during the last ten days were the hogs fed grain.

Mr. Achilles, a few days ago, sold ten hogs that had not been fattened on alfalfa. These hogs he bought at \$4 each, spent as much more on feeds, shorts and other feed, and sold the animals at a trifle over \$14 each. Mr. Achilles states, however, that they cost a great deal more and brought less profit than the alfalfa fed hogs.

Mr. Lounsbury is making a special study of alfalfa, that he may take charge of small tracts of land in all parts of the valley for the valley for the Southern Pacific Company for experimental purposes. The railroad demonstrate the value of alfalfa as a forage crop, and the adaptability of valley soil to alfalfa growing. The tracts are of five acres each, and will be farmed according to the most approved methods.—Telegram.
