Auxiliary Plant.

"The Citizens Lighting and Traction Co., of Cottage Grove" is the label on a big dynamo, and exciter, together with a number of packages of parts, which arrived in Cottage Grove Thursday from Salem. On inquiry of Mr. Thompson what the meaning of it was, he said that he supposed the Wilamette Valley Co., which is to take possession of the local plant here the first of the month, is sending this machinery down from its Salem plant, to be installed as an auxiliary plant in the present electric plant. Under the existing conditions, if a breakdown were to occur, the town would be out of lights until repairs could be made, but if a second dynamo is connected up already, a break would mean only a few minutes darkness. If Mr. Thompson is correct in his surmises, this is only the first of a number of important changes which the new company will make in the plant here.

Suitor May Yet Locate Here.

There has been some talk of Mr. Suitor having given up all hopes of locating here, owing to the breaking off of negotiations with Mr. Young, but we have good reason to believe that there is still a reasonable chance of his locating here, which we trust will become a positive fact.
