COMMENCEMENT COMING

HOME INDUSTRY.

There is an old saying to the effect that a young man should start life away from his home town to be appreciated for his merits. This is not only true of men, but of industries. Wherever there is a home industry to be patronized, you will find merchants and customers who will send away for such articles, and get either the same or a poorer grade, simply because it may cost them a couple of cents less. Those same merchants and customers will always be kicking because the town does not progress, when they are one of the causes for its not doing so.

We have a creamery, which is able to supply all the butter that can be used in the town, and makes a better butter than any that can be obtained elsewhere, and that pays the farmers of the community more for their butter fat than any place else. What do our citizens do? Many of them insist on having a cheaper grade of butter than the creamery butter in order to save a few cents, and what can the merchants do.

Some of them put the price of all outside butter, that they have to ship in, to cover shortages or otherwise, at the same price they have to charge for our local creamery butter and then sell country butter at 25 cents per pound, others put a lower price on the outside butters, which of course works a hardship on the town creamery.

We have a flour mill that gives us as good flour as any mill and sells to the merchants on a very close margin so that practically all the merchants handle nothing but their brands, yet some merchants ship in flour because they can save a few cents per 100 pounds by buying in carloads and then sell at the same price as other flour, or cut the price just a little.

These things do not help home industry. So remember if you want to live, other people are in the same boat, and must be able to make money enough to do so and each persons support in a town, to its own industries is a benefit.

GREAT THINGS ARE DOING IN OREGON.

No state in the United States has more new and great enterprises being wrought on than Oregon this year. Many hundreds of miles of

new railroads, running in all directions, the great Celilo canal works, the irrigation projects, great packing plants in Portland, new saw mills being erected, electric lines established, great water power plants being built, all points to the initiation of the greatest era of Oregon's already famous prosperity.

Everyday great capitalists are buying up timber, farming land and other industries, finding here a good investment for their capital. The East is just discovering Oregon and its possibilities, and is going to take rapid advantage of its discovery.

The Lewis & Clark Exposition has been to Portland and Oregon a Godsend, while such expositions to other cities and states, have in many cases been almost deathblows, but here we are gaining day by day from the advertisement which the great exposition gave to the entire state.

Condensed News.

The O. R. & N. has let a contract for the building of a 47 mile line of track from Walla Walla river to Joseph at a cost of a million and a half of dollars.

Thirty thousand acres of land between Philomath and Yaquina Bay was sold the first of the week to an Eastern Syndicate for \$80,000. The sale was made at Junction City.

A Portland contractor D. C. O'Reilly, has submitted an offer to the City Council to build a line on Front Street and give the city one half of all the net receipts ever and above the cost of operation and maintenance and 6 per cent on the money invested, and further stipulates that all other persons or corporations shall have free access to the line and shall have equal rights to use it. The switching charge shall be \$2 instead of \$2.50 as fixed in the ordinances of the United Railways and the Willamette Traction company, and shall be reducible from year to year. The city is to have the right to acquire the line at practically any time on payment of its cost. The franchise is to be revocable on breach of any of its conditions. The council is considering the two franchise applications, and will probably render a decision in a few days.
