**A SOMETHING ALWAYS WANTED.**

The hens in this section are working overtime these days and eggs are so plentiful that the merchants are about to make up a large number of cases for shipment. They are a little afraid the hens may declare a strike after working so hard and leave them to ship in again. This is a good country for poultry, and it is strange that no large chicken ranches have been established. Several men have started in to do this but none of them have much means to put into it and to get a large business, either requires a large initial expense or years of hard work.

Joseph Medill Patterson, son of R. W. Patterson, editor of the Chicago Tribune, who has recently come into national prominence through his espousal of the Socialist cause, is stated to have been cut off by his father with only 40 cents, which probably is quite a Socialist advertisement, although the blow to his father must be heavy. The young man has been prominent in political and civic life for several years and his step is causing much talk.

Eugene's brick yard has started up for the seasons run, and has a large number of orders already on hand.

While our county seat is fussing over municipal ownership, they better come down and look over Cottage Grove's water plant and see how much cheaper it is to own their own system, and get first class, pure water, and that too at a reasonable rate, than to allow such a public utility to be run by a company or individual.

The editor of the Guard was rather badly injured Wednesday morning while riding his bicycle on the sidewalks of Eugene, in an attempt to go by some people using the walk. It seems that Eugene has not yet developed to that point where her walks are reserved for the use of pedestrians only, as it is here, and that bicycle riders, as well as pedestrians have equal rights on her sidewalks. As long as such is the case it is unfortunate that there are some people who will try to take up the whole sidewalk when a wheelman comes near, and force the wheelman either into the fence or off the walk.

The City Council is working on a revision of the water rates to make them more equitable the whole city over. While it is about it let them set aside sufficient money to purchase water meters, and at every place of business, install a meter, with a graduated scale of prices, from 1000 gallons up, so that the owner of a place of business that uses 100,000 gallons per month pays much less per 1000 than the single thousand user, which would be just to all, and then each man would pay for what he uses.

The increased receipts would far more than pay for the meters and while we are adjusting the rates, let us get them fixed right.

The people of this state can certainly trust H. M. Cake, of Portland, to represent their interests in the United States Senate. As a Republican, his loyalty to the settled principles of the party has never been questioned. **Fair Play In Politics.**

In the course of an editorial on the subject of "Fair Play" the Coos Bay Harbor, published at North Bend, Coos County, says.

The Harbor's attention has been called to certain misrepresentations about Hon. W. C. Hawley who also seeks Congressional honors. Circulars are issued giving him the title of Reverend. Mr. Hawley is a professor in Willamette University and is in no wise connected with the ministry. While a man cannot have a higher title than that of Reverend yet this is supposed to prejudice certain voters against Mr. Hawley.

What is a still more flagrant violation of all ethics and fair play is the story being circulation that Mr. Hawley was at one time insane and had to be confined in an insane asylum. The only foundation for this was an illness in which he was at times delirious with fever. Mr. Hawley was never insane.

Any candidate who is not willing to stand on his own merits but who depends for his votes upon injuring the character of another is not worthy to represent the great State of Oregon at the National Capital.

**General News.**

The Oregon Agricultural college is sending out to all interested, pamphlets on the San Jose scale, and its treatments, also on canning fruit and vegetables and preserving fruit juices.

The Miners and Operators are still in session in Indianapolis fighting over the wage scale. The difference in the scales proposed by the two sides are slight and it is thought that there is a good chance that the matter will be amicably adjusted.

The Oregon Land Fraud cases are to be delayed still further on account of the setting of the hearing of Binger Hermann for April 16 which will of necessity keep Special Prosecutor Heney in the East until that case is settled.

In Salem the Pacific States Telephone Co. has commenced suit against a rival company to prohibit their using the streets of the town.

The Journal states that of one hundred and seventy-three legislative candidates all but forty five have signed Statement No. One.

Buzuan, Montana, is up in arms because the government insists upon the deportation of a pretty Chinese widow, whose husband was recently killed by a rival. The lady is finely educated and is much thought of.

Brazil has a good way of keeping accounts, and money too, it seems, as only recently was a great sum found to be missing after having been shipped to a treasury three years ago; the consequent search through vaults disclosed many other overlooked chests of bullion, etc.
