Day Current Coming.

The Willamette Valley Co. has moved its office to the vacant store room opposite the postoffice, which is much larger and gives a better opportunity for a display. Mr. Welch is very busy getting settled in his new home, as well as starting many improvements. A large number of new poles have been ordered, and the lines will be thoroughly rebuilt. The first of two 150 horse power engines that are to be installed here, has been delivered and is on the skids at the plant, waiting for the enlargement of the building, and the construction of suitable foundations to hold it. The two engines and dynamo now in use as well as the 75 horse power boiler have been sold and will be shipped elsewhere. A new 200 horse power boiler from the Eugene plant will be installed in place of the old one, and connected so as to work in conjunction with the one already in place. A day current is expected by the first of June.

This is an increase of 41 boys and 29 girls, or a total of 70 over the preceding year. From this census the allotment of school funds for the next school session is made up.

Mrs. Condon

Mrs. Emma J. Condon was born in Franklin, Delaware County, N. Y., Nov. 3d, 1849. Died at her home in Cottage Grove, Mar. 25, 1906. She came to the Pacific Coast in 1877 and has lived in Oregon since 1879. Shortly after coming west she was married to Mr. Southworth (deceased) of California. Later she was married to Mr. P. G. Condon, who died about four years ago.

Mrs. Condon was the mother of seven children, six of whom remain to mourn her departure: Mrs. Etta Walsh of Salem, Mrs. Julia Burkshire and Mrs. Gertrude Matthews of Coburg, Mr. Stellman Southworth of Oakland, Irene Condon of this city and Leland of Portland.

About fifteen years ago Mrs. Condon became a follower of Jesus Christ, casting her lot with the Church of Christ in Cottage Grove, being a charter member of its reorganization. She was faithful as a Christian and at her death was teacher of the Bible class and an active member of the Ladies' Aid of the Christian Church. Faithful in her service she was always to be found where she could be of aid and comfort to the those in need of comfort and encouragement.

Sister Condon was a loving mother, a kind neighbor, and a helpful friend. She will be greatly missed by her children, her friends and the church.
