

Washington Special Correspondence.

Every encouragement that can be given the Government to begin forestry propagation and more effective protection of existing forests from fires, has come from Oregon. In the early days of forest reserve formation, the Government has not given much attention to the more serious duties that will follow later, when matured timber is being cut, and urgent public needs require rapid reforestation as nature will permit. In Oregon these possibilities are at their best. All reserves created on the lower ranges will have a moist, equable climate. They will be on ground where nature produced the best forests known to the world. It follows that propagation there should be easiest, and it is expected that the Government's first important work in reforestation will be undertaken on some of the burned or cut areas of Oregon or Washington.

Burned acreage in Oregon aggregates more than 5,000 square miles. Washington is not much short in loss from this cause. The aggregate wealth thus sent up in smoke reaches many millions. Much of the burned area is in territory where tree growth is rank. Under ordinary conditions, it is believed that another growth should easily be started. Such areas as this are conceded to open the most inviting field for the Government's propagation work, and it is also further concluded that when the Government begins this important part of a true forestry policy, making a reserve yield a greater amount of timber than the land would have yielded in the natural course of progress, the people will feel more pacific toward the reserve spirit, which so far has done nothing more than bottle present resources for the enjoyment of coming generations.

In all of the work done by the Oregon delegation, assurance has been given the administration officials that the principle of the reserve is not combatted. The recent work undertaken by Senator Fulton, to eliminate land more valuable for other purposes than forestry, was with the assurance that no further object was sought. After checking too generous consecration of Oregon to national needs, and eliminating good agricultural and grazing lands, the Oregon delegation will devote its best energies to the work of having the Government begin exercising full forestry duties.

National attention is turning to Oregon's political contest, which is to be the advance guard of the next general election. This week Oregon was dismissed. The tariff revision sentiment of the East believes that the "st and 2 patters" are hurting the Republican party, and where not laboring with this conviction, are using the argument to coerce promise of some form of revision. Delay in enacting railway rate legislation has been seized upon as another token of a squall. Philippines tariff bills, yet pending, with little promise of becoming law, are also seized upon as another discontent omen in the party.

With various arguments pro and con, a real interest is being generated, Oregon, being first, is first in point of interest, chronologically at least. Party leaders everywhere in the East are asking if there is prospect of Oregon turning. They grasp at everything of an intelligent stamp bearing on this question. Republicans do not veil their uneasiness. They note that a democrat is governor, a democrat mayor of the principal city, and a democrat has been appointed senator. If the democrat should be returned to the senate by popular vote, and one or two congressmen of the same faith were sent on, consternation would not indicate the feeling here. In view of these bare possibilities, republican leaders are eager to show wherein Oregon has everything to gain by keeping in the party ranks of the past. Pains are taken to show how Oregon, with a democratic delegation, would be placed in the ranks of the Southern states, which can accomplish nothing more in the national legislature than look after local affairs.

President Notifies Senator Fulton He is Convinced Bristol was Not Guilty of International Wrong Doing.

Washington, March 28.—President Roosevelt has decided to again appoint W. C. Bristol U. S. district attorney of Oregon. He notified Senator Fulton of his decision this morning and stated that upon full consideration of the case he was convinced that Bristol was not guilty of intentional wrongdoing in writing the letter upon which the former nomination was withdrawn. Fulton says he will not oppose the confirmation. It is believed the judiciary committee of the senate will take a stand against the confirmation.

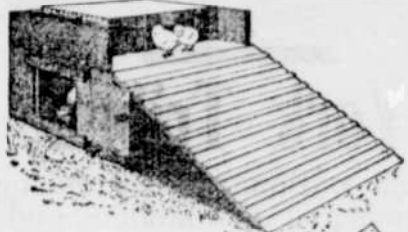

RAISING CHICKS.

How to Make a Brooder Out of an Old Packing Case.

Those who prefer the artificial method of raising chicks can make a brooder out of an old packing case which will accommodate fifty chicks at a cost of about a dollar. Such a brooder has given excellent results at one of the experiment stations when used in a shed or colony house. Details of construction of a brooder of this kind are shown in the illustrations. A lower section of the brooder, which contains the lamp for heating, is a three

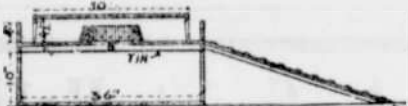


HOMEMADE BROODER.

feet square made of ten inch boards which is covered with tin or galvanized iron.

Above this cover, around the edges of the lamp box, one inch strips are nailed. Two one inch holes are bored through these strips on each side of the box for the purpose of ventilation. A floor of matched boards is laid on the strips. A hole eight inches in diameter is cut in the center of this floor, and over it is reversed an old tin pan ten inches in diameter, the sides of the pan being punched full of holes to allow free circulation of heat. Over this is placed a table two feet six inches square, with legs four and a half inches high.

Around the sides of this table is tacked a curtain of felt cut from top to bottom at intervals of five or six inches to allow the chicks to pass in and out at will, the whole being surrounded by boards four inches high and three feet long nailed together at



SECTION THROUGH MIDDLE OF BROODER. the corners and resting on the floor of the brooder. When the chicks are ten days old one of these boards may be taken away and a bridge used so that the chicks may run from the brooder to the floor of the room.

COLD FRAME LETTUCE.

Sow Now For Succession and Transplant in March.

Sow lettuce seed now and for succession about every two weeks. Excellent varieties are: Market Gardeners, Private Stock, Immensity and Trianon Cos. Trianon Cos is usually sown about the 1st of April and from that date on till August is continued with all the varieties at intervals of seven to ten days. From that time lettuce is inclined to "bolt" or run to seed.

These are three good lettuce for all purposes. They stand the summer well and make exceedingly fine heads.

Trianon Cos when properly grown is one of the best flavored in cultivation, and Immensity is one of the largest.

As soon as they are ready put off into two inch pots, and as soon as they have filled these well with roots transfer to cold frames, which will be about the first week in March.

Provided the frames have been idle all winter take off about two inches of the old soil, and then throw it up well with a fork or spade and give it a good sprinkling of air slacked lime to sweeten the soil. If the days are mild take the sash off, putting them on again at night.

The ground should be kept constantly stirred to mellow the soil and keep down weeds, giving copious supplies of water when needed, but when heading keep the water from the heart.

The New Flax Industry.

An industry new at least to Minnesota has been introduced during quite recent years. It relates to the manufacture of flax straw into binding twine. Professor Shaw affirms in Orange Judd Farmer that one of the finest features of the new industry is that it will tend very much to lessen waste on many farms of the west. No where probably in all the United States has the sin of waste prevailed to such an extent as in the western and northwestern states. Flax straw was almost a complete waste. The greater the number of acres devoted to the growth of flax the greater was the waste.

Hampshires and the Bacon Type.

At the last international I was much amused at the discussion in various quarters as to whether the Hampshire swine are of the bacon or lard type. The individual who calls Hampshire swine bacon animals has not yet learned the A B C of what the term bacon means, remarks Professor T. W. Shaw in American Agriculturist.

The draft horse is the horse for the farmer. There is less risk in raising it, and then you have something when it is grown—something that will work and do a lot of it and something that will sell, says a farmer.

A Pacific States Promotion League.

The recent visit of the party excursionists from the state of Washington, headed by Governor Mead, to California, following as it did a similar excursion from Oregon headed by Governor Chamberlain, shows conclusively that the idea of a union of the Pacific States is nearer a consummation than many people suppose. It has been the idea of Mr. Rufus P. Jennings, chairman of the California Promotion committee, for some years that an organization for the commercial and industrial co-operation of the six Pacific coast states and the territory of Arizona, formed on the lines of the California Promotion committee would tend to bring about broader development of the coast region, and a wider recognition commercially and politically of the wonderful resources of this part of the United States.

What has been accomplished by the California Promotion committee for California in the way of publicity and development be done even on a broader scale for the entire coast region if the six states and the territory of Arizona shall join hands in furtherance of this great work. Naturally the first requisite for such a union would be the complete organization of each state under the influence of a central organization which central body would be represented in a body composed of representatives from each of the states of Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Nevada and Utah and the territory of Arizona.

What could be accomplished by such a combined effort on the part of all the interests involved on the Pacific slope is almost beyond computation. It would mean the greatest commercial and industrial power in the whole country; it would mean a political force that would compel recognition at the hands of the congress and of the governmental departments; it would mean the upbuilding of a part of the United States, the resources of which are beyond the comprehension of those who have never studied the political economy of the great western slope of the nation.

The California Promotion through its chairman, Dr. Rufus P. Jennings is preparing for an active movement in the direction of such a combination. The trip of the Washingtonians, who traversed both the states of Oregon and California, brings about a feeling of amity and community of interest. The party from Washington saw California from the northern line clear down to Los Angeles, being entertained at all points of interest in the state, and when the members returned to their homes they felt that there was a tie of kinship between their state and California. It is the fostering of this feeling that is the object of the present work of the California Promotion committee along the lines of a Pacific States Union.

M. R. Garoutte, of Cottage Grove, was in the city Thursday. Mr. Garoutte is in the lively business, and has perhaps one of the largest establishments of its kind in Southern Oregon. 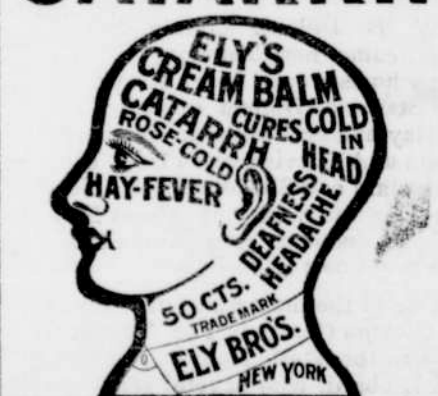
