Dear Sir: Will you permit me space in your paper to say for the benefit of those who are expecting to take the Civil Service Examination, for the position of "Forest Ranger", to be held at Roseburg, Oregon, May 14, 1906, that owing to the fact that the date of examination is close at hand, they will immediately file their application with me, if they have not filed them with the U. S. Commissioner at Washington, D. C. Application blanks can be secured by applying to this office. The examination will be along practical lines, relating to the various duties required of forest rangers. Any man who would like this class of work, that is between the age of 21 and 40 years, with a strong healthy body, need not hesitate to take the examination.
