## The Straight Party Vote is a Thing of the Past.

The vote of an entire ticket, because it is a party ticket is rapidly passing away. Every election sees more men vote for the man, not the party, and such is the true principal of government. Any party may be right in its principles, but have men nominated to support them who are not fit representatives of just citizenship, and who should not receive the support of voters of any party. The vote of the coming years will be: First, for the individual men; second, for the principles which the people wish to see carried out, and the individuals will be forced to represent such principles, irrespective of party affiliations.

## Still Time to Register.

The time to register is almost gone. Only until the 15th. Every person qualified to vote should register before the 15th, and a great number in this section are still not on the books. It will be a difficult thing to swear in a vote under the new law, and only voters registered under the new law will be entitled to vote. Let us have a big vote at the polls in June.

The recent hotel fire was just the necessary thing to induce the council to purchase a good quantity of first class hose and while the hose costs a good deal, yet the loss of one fire would more than pay for the hose.

The contracts for the grading and surfacing of a number of streets, which have been requested by citizens, should let at the earliest moment, so that the work can be done early in the spring. The council got together and agreed to have Oliver Hart connect the North Creek with the main water system, by building the "M" extension and also authorized the purchase of some extra lengths of pipe and connections for the repair of breaks. Mr. Hart got right to work and tells us that the dam and catch basin on the North Creek is practically completed and that he is pushing the work with all due speed. The catch basin is being finished with a coat of smooth cement, and will hold the water well, instead of being left rough as the other dams were.

## A Good Record.

L. R. Edmundson, the democratic candidate of State Representative is a native son of the state of Oregon and reared upon a farm in Lane county, being a descendant of a sturdy family of pioneers.

He received his education in the county schools and later graduated from the Ann Arbor Law School. Since then he has been engaged in the practice of law at Eugene, Oregon and has also been inter-

He is a fluent and able public speaker and is well equipped to represent the people's interest in the State Legislature.

## Meet After 52 Years.

Mrs. DeWolf and daughter from Tecumseh, Michigan, arrived Tuesday to visit her brother, Mr. O. P. Adams and family who has not seen her since the spring of 1854. Mr. Adams is 78, was born in Pennsylvania in the 30s and left his home in '54 which was the last time he saw his sister until Tuesday, came to Oregon that year and to Cottage Grove in '58. He and his sister are the only children left of a family of 10. In speaking of the changes of years he spoke of the various places where the Cottage Grove Post office located and stated that first it was in an oak grove, three quarters of a mile below Creswell near Indiana Martin's and was then called Cottage Grove and from there was moved 4 miles to John Hughes and from there to Clausarps and then to Hamilton's store near Walker. Hamilton could neither read nor write and had many signs which he used to mark down to mean he sold certain articles. Uncle Nat Martin used to have to go down there every few days and make up Hamilton's reports for him, and so finally in 1865 Hamilton died and Uncle Nat bundled the whole Post office into his wagon and brought it to his blacksmith shop in the west side where it was kept for several years. He says, "I never asked the department for permission to move it, and I guess they never knew the difference." Through all the changes the name Cottage Grove stuck to it so that name originated with a beautiful little Oak grove near Creswell.
