WHEELS ON THE SIDEWALKS.

Cottage Grove is growing and to those who live on the outskirts of the town it is quite a trip in to the business part on foot. Many would like to see an ordinance prepared for presentation to the council allowing the riding of bicycles on certain sides of streets away from the heavier travel, and to, if necessary, require permits from each wheelman, so that the matter could be well handled. Most wheelmen who live out a few blocks would be willing enough to pay a license fee of 50 cents or a \$1 a year for a permit to ride on the sidewalks out in the residence districts under certain restrictions. If each wheel was tagged it would be an easy matter to compel observance of such an ordinance, and would be a great accommodation to those living out around the edges of the city.

One of the eleven amendments that comes before the people to be voted on at the coming election is the one amending the present local option law, and if any amendment deserves to be defeated it is that one. The amendment practically destroys the work of local option in the state and should be defeated.

The U. S. Government deports anarchists wherever it finds them. It seems as though some of the writers of that essentially anarchistic paper "An Appeal to Reason" ought to be deported along with the rest. Their writings are not just socialistic, but are anarchistic. There are some good things in socialism, but faults as well, and we consider more faults than virtues. When writers call for uprisings against decisions of courts, and for arming, it certainly sounds like anarchy.

The Sheriff's office is an office of importance and at its head must have a man of good judgement, business tact and executive ability. In Fred Fisk the present incumbent of the sheriff's office we find these requirements. In his manner of handling the sheriff's work both criminal work and office work Sheriff Fisk has proven himself competent. He has been tried in all of the various tests of a sheriff, he has stood the tests, proven himself true blue and made out of the right kind of stuff for a sheriff. Fred Fisk is a painstaking servant of the people, accommodating, respecting the rights of all and serving all with fairness regardless of politics. He is honest in the discharge of his duties, economical, competent inside his office and competent out outside his office. He has made a good sheriff, satisfactory to the people and on June 4th will receive the support from the people that will again make him Sheriff of Lane County.

Benton's Jail Cost Smallest in State.

The Corvallis Times says: The jail expenses of Benton county for the past 12 months were less than that of any county in Oregon. Remembering that, with Multnomah excluded, Benton in population, is much more than an average county the statement is of exceeding interest. It tells a story of decency and good citizenship, of which Benton people ought to be proud.

The total jail expense for the year in Benton was \$29,67. Of the 45 counties in the state, only a few of the very smallest approached Benton in the smallness of the jail expense. Only three fell below \$100 and all but five ran above \$300. Some of them cost several thousand. Clatsop's jail expense, was \$92,51, Douglas, \$1,126.25 and Multnomah \$11,165.49. When District Attorney Brown some time ago, said there is less court expense in Benton than in any other county in the state he knew what he was talking about.
