MEETS DEATH IN MUSICK MINE

Frederick Phillips was Crushed to Death Monday Night by a Falling Rock.

Frederick Phillips, nineteen years old, working his second shift in an upraise in the Musick mine of the Oregon Securities Co. in Bohemia, was instantly killed Monday night about 4 o'clock by the falling of about 1500 pounds of rock upon his stomach and bowels.

The young man was new to mining and was attempting to dislodge a loose rock that weighed about a thousand pounds, just above him. He called to his fellow workmen to get out of the way and taking his pick began to pick at it but did not get out of the way quick enough himself. It took five of his companions to roll the rock off him, they think he was killed instantly. His body was brought to Cottage Grove Tuesday by Frank McIntyre and was turned over to Undertaker J. D. Cochran, the funeral service was conducted Wednesday afternoon by Rev. R. C. Grace, the body being laid to rest in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Phillips home is at Kerbyville, Josephine county, where his people reside. He was born at Klamath Falls. His father C. E. Phillips is a miner, he could not be reached in time to come to the funeral. His mother and two sisters were burned to death in the Silver Lake holocaust twelve years ago, while he escaped by hanging to a man's coat tail, being pulled down the stairs and out of danger in that manner. He leaves two sisters and a brother who with a brother-in-law were present at the funeral. His brother is just recovering from an accidental gunshot wound in his foot and is on crutches. Frederick was a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and has only been up a short time from the hospital as a result of an injury in a smelter, when he came here about two weeks ago, went up to camp, worked in the Champion for three days and then went to the Musick.

The Senate also appropriated \$12,000 for determining the extent of the defalcation of Adams at the Seattle assay office.

Owners of Vessels Ask \$6.50 a Thousand for Carrying Fir to California.

During the past week the charter rates for sailing vessels to engage in the lumber trade have advanced from \$5.50 per 1000 feet to \$6.50, and they are expected to reach \$7 before the end of the month. The owners of the schooner W. F. Garms declined an offer of \$6.25 to have the vessel return to Portland and transport the second cargo to California. They ask \$6.50 and

intimated that the tariff would soon be much higher than that figure.

This is the highest notch rates have reached since the Spanish American war. When the war was on the tariff for taking lumber down the coast on sailing vessels was \$7 per 1000 feet. After the close of hostilities the owners were anxious to place their tonnage at \$4. Within the past year or two the quotations have been about \$4.50 until very recently, when they were raised to \$5.50. It was supposed that this would prove to be the high water mark. But the unprecedented demand for lumber in San Francisco and other California ports has made it possible for all of the schooners, barks and barkentines flying the American flag to get steady employment. In fact, it is said that much more business is offering than they can handle, and for that reason the owners have decided to profit by taking advantage of the situation. There is not a schooner on the coast on the disengaged list, and the majority of them have been chartered for the season.
