HOT, HOTTER, HOTTEST, AND STILL HOTTER.

It has been a little warm in this section of the county for a week or so past, and while the people in town have suffered, those in the hay fields are feeling it the worst. Travelling men, and all coming in on the train have suffered terribly from the heat. To add to the discomfort of the people of the town there is an ice shortage and not one person in a hundred can get even a cool drink. Foods will not keep at all, and meat is being cut out of most bills of fare altogether. The ice man has tried to get ice from all points, even sending to Portland, but even there the supply is far short of the demand. The brewing plants in Linn and Lane counties that have heretofore furnished the ice for the valley towns, have claimed that most of their customers were saloon men, now with the counties dry, their ice plants are are running night and day to full capacity, and still cannot come anywhere near supplying orders. The Weimar plant at Eugene says it will enlarge its plant at once to five times its present capacity. The creamery and Bartels meat shop are considering putting in a plant. It has now been proved, by the consumption of more than an entire car of ice within a week, that a plant would pay in the Grove, and in all probability before another year there will be a plant here.

EUGENE IS FIRST, COTTAGE GROVE NEXT.

The Willamette Valley Co. has secured a franchise in Eugene and in all probability a franchise will soon be asked for from Cottage Grove. The large plant put in by that company at this point, and the arrangement of the plant, for double its present capacity would indicate in itself, outside of the statements of the company's representatives, that the present lighting and power furnished were but one of the uses for which the plant was intended, and would outline that it was the intention of the company to have other use for so large a plant, and outside of power for mills, and electric lighting other than of Cottage Grove proper, such power would help to furnish power for a valley electric road. If the company applies for a franchise here it should be granted, and that too gladly by the people and the council, and without any unreasonable restrictions. Every company wants all it can get the same, as every ordinary person, but our wants and wishes must all be ruled by our existence in peace and harmony with our fellows, and each one must give up some of his wishes to the general good. We hope the company applies for a franchise here, and if it does we want to see it granted, and Cottage Grove have an electric line, running through here in the course of a couple of years.

Haying.

The haying season is on in full blast at the present time and a greater quantity is being put up than ever before. On account of the increase in dairying the farmers are putting up much more ensilage as well, and still more will have to be put up next year. The reapers will commence on the grain next week, and as yet the grain has not been much damaged by the heat, although it is beginning to be felt. All the wheat that is raised in this vicinity is hauled to the Hartung & Hansen mill, and is but a drop in the bucket in supplying the wheat ground in the mill each year. There is no reason why sufficient wheat should not be raised to supply not only the local market, but leave a quantity to be shipped.

The meat markets all have a decided kick on the weather of the last couple of weeks. They sold very little meat for no one is eating hardly any meat, and it is a very difficult thing for them to keep their meat fresh and in good condition without a great expenditure in ice for keeping the meat cool. J. H. Bartel is fortunate with the present shortage in the ice supply of having a first class refrigeration plant, which gives him cool storage boxes all the time.

The swimming holes are made good use of these days. The hole just above the mill dam is a good place, but is rather muddy from the stirring up of many people. The best places are out on Row River about a mile, but that is more of a walk than most folks enjoy this weather. With as good a place close at hand as the dam, some shelter should be arranged and a time set apart in order that the ladies might enjoy a swim as well as the men and boys. Let everybody have a chance.

The franchise granted the Willamette Valley Co. at Eugene has not been accepted yet, but the general provisions of it were known to both the council and the company before it was brought up, and Mr. A. Welch, who has just come out of one of Portland's hospitals after an operation for appendicitis, said to a Portland newspaper man that he saw no reason why the franchise should not be accepted. The Eugene papers state that the council stands ready to make any minor changes that may be necessary, as long as the essential features of the franchise are not changed. Good for Eugene, that at last she did it. We hope that the railway will prove of great benefit to the town, and that it will sooner or later be extended to the Grove.

Big S. P. Oil Burning Engine Blows Up.

Engine 2625, one of the big engines recently put on by the S. P. exploded near Ashland Thursday while helping a train up the grade. The engineer and fireman were both badly hurt, but not fatally. The cause of the accident is unknown.

Issue of New Panama Bonds.

Secretary of the Treasury Shaw on Monday last took a step which has been looked forward to for some time past in ordering the sale of thirty million dollars of new two per cent bonds for the construction of the Panama canal. The new bonds are to be dated August 1, 1906, with interest payable quarterly, their denominations varying from \$20 to \$1,000 for coupons, and from \$20 to \$10,000 for registered securities. As they will not be payable until after ten years, with a maximum duration of 30 years, it is believed that the new issue will prove attractive and will be generally taken up throughout the country. The bids are to be sent to the division of loans and currency before July 20. Secretary Shaw's announcement that the smaller bidders are to receive priority makes the law resemble, in some respects, the popular loan floated by Secretary Gage some years ago. It is also thought that the popular character of the loan should it be successfully maintained, will result in gathering in funds from outlying parts of the country and in weakening to a much smaller degree the resources of the central banks than would be the case were the bonds to be sold immediately in large blocks. To gather in this way more than thirty million dollars—since the securities will undoubtedly command a considerable premium—will give the department a large power, taken in connection with the surplus already accumulated, of depositing with the banks of the country should conditions appear to demand relief of that character. When the treasury called in, a week or so ago, the ten million dollars deposited with certain banks last spring, for the purpose of transferring it to San Francisco banks, it was stated that the secretary had intended, as this money was called for, to issue the Panama bonds and then re-deposit the cash with the banks on these very bonds as security. This has strengthened the belief that such deposits may shortly be announced in addition to the transfers to San Francisco—U. S. Investor.
