Hop Rates Reduced to East.

The railroads announce the following reduction in freight rates on hops going east:

Chicago, July 21, 1906.
Effective August 25, 1906, hop rate, Eastern common points, east-bound \$2 per 100 pounds, carloads, minimum weight, space loading capacity of car, but in no case less than 20,000 pounds. All arrangements for free storage and free local service to points of concentration to be cancelled.

Bartels Ice Plant.

J. H. Bartels says that just as soon as he can get away now he will go to Portland and order a big compressor for his ice plant and will begin to install an ice plant. He will continue his brick building to the alley and will build another big cooler, almost as big as the present one in it, half of which will be used to store ice in, and the balance to store butter and eggs. He has made arrangements with the Willamette Valley electric company for a twenty horse power motor to run the plant with, which will be installed as soon as the plant is complete. Mr. Bartels will probably use his present compressor to cool the meat refrigerator, adding one just for ice.

He has just installed two fans which will be run by his power plant, and which keeps the air in the shop fresh and cool. Fred Bartels and F. M. Ernest drove up thirty head of fine cattle from Oakland on Wednesday and Thursday as they could not get a car to ship them in. Fred is going to Portland the first of next month to spend three or four weeks in an ice factory becoming thoroughly posted on ice manufacture, as he is the machinist of the firm.

Drain Contracts Go to Grove.

Veatch & Lawson were awarded the contract for the painting and papering in the Normal School at Drain, the contract amounting to several hundred dollars.

Geo. Lea has been awarded the contract for the addition to the Normal school building. C. E. Stewart has been granted a franchise to put in a complete water system for Drain, the work for which has been planned by Geo. Lea. It is understood that Lea will put in the plant for Mr. Stewart. The cost of the work is between \$6500 and \$7500.

All these contracts are yet to be signed up by the Grove people but have been awarded to them.
