### Water Supply.

Chas. VanDenburg and Oliver  
Veatch took a walk our last Sunday  
to inspect the water system, and  
found that the water pressure of  
the system was such that the water  
overflows from the reservoir east of  
town, on account of its being so  
much lower than the reservoirs at  
the source of supply, and they sug-  
gested that the supply be turned  
off at the east reservoir, so that the  
full force could be had on the  
mains, and leave the water in that  
reservoir, as well as in the McFar-  
land reservoir purely for fire pur-  
poses. At the present time the  
water supply is far greater than the  
demand, and water is running from  
the spillway constantly.

### DIED

Miss Lucy Rebecca Job, daugh-  
ter of Mayor B. R. Job and wife of  
Cottage Grove, dropped asleep  
Monday morning in the sleep that  
knows no waking, after having  
patiently borne years of suffering,  
knowing well her years could be  
but few. She was not quite 18  
and has for several years been in  
very poor health. Her mother  
and sister have been with her in  
Southern California until the last  
couple of months hoping that the  
climate would benefit her, but find-  
ing it did not returned and until  
last Thursday she has done very  
well, but then began to sink,  
quietly and easily falling asleep,  
with her dear ones gathered round,  
skill and loving care availed noth-  
ing.

A simple funeral service was  
held Monday evening and Tues-  
day morning the body was taken  
to Corvallis, her birthplace and the  
family home, for interment.

She was always cheerful and pa-  
tient, with a kind and tender word  
for everyone, and it is thought  
that her sickness was to a certain  
extent resultant upon her rapid  
growth, her ambition to make the  
most of her unusual talents, and  
her close and hard study. Her  
death leaves a void that is hard to  
fill in the home.

### Another Pioneer Gone to the Last Rest

Alvaro Hawley Hubbard, an old  
pioneer and one of Cottage Grove's  
oldest citizens, died at the family  
residence on Seventh street in Cot-  
tage Grove on Tuesday evening at  
10:15 of dropsy. He was born  
May 7, 1832 in Alleghany county,  
New York, and in 1853 crossed the  
plains to Oregon, locating at Rose-  
burg, where he made his home and  
was married on Oct. 28th, 1865 to  
Susan E. Crenshaw, who survives  
him. On Nov. 28, 1872 he moved  
to Cottage Grove where the family  
has resided ever since. Ten chil-  
dren were born to them of whom

nine were living.

A short service was held at the  
family residence Thursday at 10  
o'clock by Rev. Wallace, after  
which the remains were laid to  
rest in the Brumbaugh cemetery.

### Death of Dr. Brookhart.

After many months of suffering  
from paralysis and heart trouble,  
Dr. H. B. Brookhart died Saturday  
at the Soldiers' Home Hospital in  
Roseburg, and was buried next  
day in the Home cemetery at that  
place.

Deceased was 69 years and 8  
months of age, and was a native of  
Kentucky. He served three years  
as sergeant in the Civil war in Gen.  
Grant's old regiment—Co. H, 21st  
Illinois Infantry. He practiced  
medicine for many years at Drain,  
where he was held by high esteem  
by all who knew him for his many  
sterling qualities.—Nonpareil.

### Copper Mining in the Valley Grows.

Since the opening up of the Kel-  
say copper property near Creswell,  
farmers all along the valley are ex-  
amining the ledges on their prop-  
erty. It is said that ledges just as  
good and prominent as the Kelsay  
property run to within a mile of  
the Grove, and that a number of  
men have been busy investigating  
them. Work is progressing rapidly  
at the Kelsay property and also on  
the Sears property which was re-  
cently bonded.

### Lumber Yard Burns.

Last Wednesday evening the  
lumber yard of Col. D. W. Huffar  
at Divide was burned. Mr. Huffar  
has a sawmill at that point and had  
about 10,000,000 feet of timber  
stored in the yard awaiting ship-  
ment. Hornets had built a nest at  
one end of a pile of lumber, and  
the boys set fire to the nest to get  
rid of it, and watched it carefully  
until they thought it was all out,  
then left it, and later were aroused  
to find the whole yard in flames,  
which had evidently spread from  
the fire in the nests, which are like  
punk and hold fire a long time. In  
spite of all that could be done the  
entire yard was burned, entailing a  
great loss on Mr. Huffar, as he  
had his entire cut already bargained  
for.
