Government Experts at the Fair.

Visitors at the Oregon State Fair during the week (Sept. 10-15) will not only find the various lines of agriculture, horticulture, mechanical and fine art exhibits of interest, but also a demonstration of the leading topics in all of our rural districts at this time, namely "good roads". Just outside of the north fence line of the State Fair grounds can be seen from beginning to end the building of a modern highway. The United States government road experts are at work upon a mile of experimental road.

This piece of work is well under way and a quarter of a mile is now ready for use. The plan is first a systematic grading and drainage which is thoroughly done, then a 5-inch coating of coarse crushed rock thoroughly rolled, when wet and the final coating of finer crushed rock sprinkled and rolled until the print of a team and wagon cannot be noticed after having passed over the finished surface. This feature alone is worthy of a trip to the Fair.

Poor Widow But Owns Three Houses.

"I'm a poor widow woman and if you destroy my fruit I don't know what I will do." These words were addressed to Richard Deich, county fruit inspector, who discovered several boxes of apples badly infected with disease. The fruit was in a wagon driven by the widow.

Weather Summary for week Aug. 20.

During the first day of the week showers occurred in the northern coast counties and in the northeast portion of the state. These showers, as a rule, were light, and droughty conditions continue in practically all portions of the state. Forest fires are burning in many places and the atmosphere has become very smoky. It is not expected that the forest fires will be put out or the atmosphere cleared of smoke until, good, soaking rains occur, and they are badly needed at the present time. The temperatures averaged about six degrees lower than the preceding week. The nights were about three degrees cooler than usual in the western counties and about two degrees cooler than usual in the eastern counties. The afternoon temperatures were about normal in all parts of the state. Light frosts were reported in a few exposed places in Tillamook county. The prevailing winds were northwesterly.
